**FORMAL
WRITTEN COMPLAINT**

a Justice of the Columbia Town Court,
Herkimer County.

1. Article VI, Section 22, of the Constitution of the State of New York establishes a Commission on Judicial Conduct (“Commission”), and Section 44, subdivision 4, of the Judiciary Law empowers the Commission to direct that a Formal Written Complaint be drawn and served upon a judge.
2. The Commission has directed that a Formal Written Complaint be drawn and served upon John M. Skinner (“Respondent”), a Justice of the Columbia Town Court, Herkimer County.
3. The factual allegations set forth in Charges I through III state acts of judicial misconduct by Respondent in violation of the Rules of the Chief Administrator of the Courts Governing Judicial Conduct (“Rules”).
4. Respondent has been a Justice of the Columbia Town Court, Herkimer County, since 2009. His current term expires on December 31, 2028. Respondent is not an attorney.

CHARGE I

5. From in or about November 2023, to in or about March 2024, in connection with his handling of *People v B* ■■■ *G* ■■■ and *People v B* ■■■ *G* ■■■, Respondent:

- A. engaged in and considered unauthorized *ex parte* conversations with the defendants;
- B. improperly considered undated photographs of a deer carcass as a basis to dismiss dog-at-large charges from cases that occurred months apart, and to prejudicially reject a subsequently filed trespass charge against B ■■■ G ■■■;
- C. dismissed the charges without notice to or consent of the prosecution, contrary to Sections 170.45 and 210.45 of the Criminal Procedure Law (“CPL”);
- D. summoned the complaining witness to appear before him after dismissing the case, without legal authority to do so; and
- E. failed to mechanically record the proceedings, in violation of Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.

6. Respondent engaged in the foregoing conduct, notwithstanding having been censured by the Commission in 2018, *inter alia*, for failing to maintain professional competence in the law and failing to mechanically record proceedings.

Specifications to Charge I

7. In 2018, Respondent was censured by the Commission for failing to be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it, in that, *inter alia*,

he: “(A) unduly delayed holding a hearing and failed to decide the defendant’s request for a jury trial until after he rendered judgment; (B) failed to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court pursuant to Section 1704 of the Uniform Justice Court Act; and (C) failed to mechanically record any appearances in the matter, in violation of Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.” A copy of the Commission’s determination is appended as Exhibit 1.

8. On or about November 14, 2023, R [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] was issued three appearance tickets under the name “B [REDACTED]” G [REDACTED], directing him to appear in the Columbia Town Court on November 21, 2023, for violating Section 2010-01(5) of the Dog Licensing and Control Law for the Town of Columbia (Local Law 2010-01, Section 5). The complainant in the matter was Mr. G [REDACTED]’s neighbor, J [REDACTED] T [REDACTED]. Copies of the tickets are appended as Exhibit 2.

9. On or about December 19, 2023, Mr. G [REDACTED] and his cousin, B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED], appeared in court. Respondent did not notify the prosecution or Mr. T [REDACTED] of the appearance, and neither was present for the proceeding.

10. During the appearance, Respondent engaged in an extensive *ex parte* discussion with Mr. G [REDACTED] and B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] regarding their version of the events underlying the tickets, and he viewed photographs they had brought to

court. Although Respondent determined that the defendant was guilty of the charge, he nevertheless dismissed it with a warning that the defendant should keep his dogs off Mr. T■■■■'s property. A copy of Respondent's incomplete court record memorializing Mr. G■■■■'s appearance and the warning is appended as Exhibit 3.

11. Respondent did not notify the prosecution or Mr. T■■■■ of his *sua sponte* dismissal of the charges in the G■■■■ matter.

12. On or about December 18, 2023, Mr. T■■■■ filed another dog-at-large complaint against R■■■■ G■■■■.

13. On or about December 20, 2023, Mr. G■■■■ was issued two additional appearance tickets following the new dog-at-large complaint by Mr. T■■■■. These tickets directed Mr. G■■■■ to appear at the Columbia Town Court on January 9, 2024, for violating Local Law 2010-01, Section 5. Copies of the tickets, again issued under the name "B■■■■" G■■■■, are appended as Exhibit 4.

14. On or about December 26, 2023, Respondent reviewed the complaint form signed by Mr. T■■■■ on December 18, 2023, and marked it dismissed as follows: "12/26/23...APPEARED 12/19/23...DISMISSED JMS." A copy of the complaint form with Respondent's note memorializing the dismissal is appended as Exhibit 5.

15. On or about December 31, 2023, Mr. T [REDACTED] signed an information alleging that B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] committed the violation of Trespass in contravention of Section 140.05 of the Penal Law. A copy of the information is appended as Exhibit 6. On or about January 1, 2024, Trooper Flynn filed the information in Respondent's court and asked Respondent to issue a criminal summons for B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED]. A copy of Trooper Flynn's request is appended as Exhibit 7.

16. On or about January 9, 2024, having been advised by R [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] and B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] during an *ex parte* discussion that Mr. T [REDACTED] was illegally harvesting deer, Respondent made a note on the complaint form dated December 18, 2023, as follows: "1/9/2024 DEER CARCAS [sic] IN NEIGHBORING YARD...T [REDACTED] HARVESTED DEER?" and "ON HOLD...RESCH. 3/19/24." Respondent made this note notwithstanding that Mr. T [REDACTED] was a complaining witness against the G [REDACTED] and not a defendant in Respondent's court. A copy of the form with Respondent's note is appended as Exhibit 8.

17. On or about January 9, 2024, Respondent orally advised Trooper Flynn that his request for a summons for B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] was denied. Respondent then dismissed the trespass charge against B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] and noted the court's file: "CRIMINAL SUMMONS DENIED...JUDGE

SKINNER...CASE CLOSED.” A copy of Respondent’s note memorializing the foregoing is appended as Exhibit 7.

18. In or about February 2024, Mr. T [REDACTED] confronted Respondent at a town board meeting regarding his handling of the G [REDACTED] matters. At that time, Respondent orally directed Mr. T [REDACTED] to appear in court on March 5, 2024, in connection with the cases, notwithstanding that he lacked the jurisdiction or authority to do so.

19. On or about March 5, 2024, Mr. T [REDACTED] appeared in court, as directed by Respondent, who told Mr. T [REDACTED] that he had been “invited” to court as a “courtesy,” “to listen” to Respondent’s explanation of what he had done in the G [REDACTED] matters. A copy of the transcript of this appearance is appended as Exhibit 9.

20. During the appearance, Respondent admitted to engaging in *ex parte* discussions with the G [REDACTED] defendants, viewing their photographs, and dismissing the charges against them based upon those communications. When Mr. T [REDACTED] attempted to explain that the charges involved multiple incidents and that the G [REDACTED] misled Respondent about the deer during their *ex parte* conversation, Respondent continually interrupted him. Respondent advised Mr. T [REDACTED] that the charges against R [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] and B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] had been dismissed because “They brought in pictures of deer that apparently the dogs went

and ate on.” (Exhibit 9, pp 4-5.) He added, “Admittedly, [the dogs] were on adjacent property-- and reputedly, that is your land. That’s my understanding of the event.” (Exhibit 9, p 5.) Respondent also admitted that Mr. T [REDACTED]’s interests were unrepresented during the proceeding, stating, “That’s what occurred, nobody was here at the time that-- in your-- representing your part of it. All I did was listen to-- you have the written charges on the document. You have the written charges and I had them present in court telling what occurred.” (Exhibit 9, p 7.) Respondent further admonished Mr. T [REDACTED], “I suggest that you work in harmony with your neighbor and get along with your neighbor.” (Exhibit 9, p 12.)

21. Respondent testified before the Commission on April 10, 2025. A copy of the transcript for this proceeding, including exhibits, is appended as Exhibit 10.

22. When asked about hearing and viewing evidence presented by unsworn defendants, Respondent was unable to identify the nature of the proceeding and repeatedly referred to it as an “evaluation.” (Exhibit 10, pp 26 and 29.)

23. When Respondent was asked if he had retained the defendant’s photographs for the court’s file, he indicated the photographs he had relied upon in dismissing the charges were not retained. (Exhibit 10, p 28.)

24. When Respondent was asked if he had dismissed the dog-at-large case against R ■■■ G ■■■, he at first indicated, “No. I give them -- I don’t think that’s dismissing. That’s giving them a specific instruction by virtue of what occurred.” (Exhibit 10, p 30.) When Respondent was shown where he noted the file with the word “dismissed,” he testified, “It was dismissed with the instructions to keep the dog at home.” (Exhibit 10, p 31.)

25. Respondent testified that he did not know what his statutory authority was for dismissing the dog-at-large charges and that he dismissed them notwithstanding that the defendants had done something “inappropriate” in permitting their dogs to run loose on Mr. T ■■■’s property. (Exhibit 10, pp 30-32.)

26. Respondent testified that he sees nothing wrong with how he handled the case of *People v B ■■■ G ■■■*, stating, “No. I clearly indicated that there is definite complaint, and they clearly indicated why the dog was on the property.” (Exhibit 10, p 35.)

27. Respondent failed to mechanically record any of the proceedings involving R ■■■ G ■■■ and B ■■■ G ■■■, as required by Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.¹

28. By reason of the foregoing, Respondent should be disciplined for cause, pursuant to Article VI, Section 22, subdivision (a), of the Constitution and Section 44, subdivision 1, of the Judiciary Law, in that Respondent failed to uphold the integrity and independence of the judiciary by failing to maintain high standards of conduct so that the integrity and independence of the judiciary would be preserved, in violation of Section 100.1 of the Rules; failed to avoid impropriety and the appearance of impropriety, in that he failed to respect and comply with the law and failed to act in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary, in violation of Section 100.2(A) of the Rules; and failed to perform the duties of judicial office impartially and diligently, in that he failed to be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it, in violation of Section 100.3(B)(1) of the Rules, failed to perform the duties of judicial office without bias or prejudice against or in favor of any person, in violation of Section 100.3(B)(4) of the Rules, and failed to accord to every person who has a legal interest in a proceeding the right to be heard according to law, and initiated, permitted or considered *ex parte* communications, in violation of Section 100.3(B)(6) of the Rules.

CHARGE II

29. From in or about December 2023, to in or about January 2024, in connection with three traffic matters – *People v T* [REDACTED] [REDACTED], *People v B* [REDACTED] [REDACTED] and *People v D* [REDACTED] [REDACTED] – Respondent engaged in the following:
- A. In *People v T* [REDACTED] [REDACTED], Respondent conducted an unauthorized *ex parte* conversation with the defendant and dismissed the charge without notice to or consent of the prosecution, as required by CPL Sections 170.45 and 210.45;
 - B. In *People v B* [REDACTED] [REDACTED], Respondent conducted an unauthorized *ex parte* conversation with the defendant and dismissed the charge without notice to or consent of the prosecution, as required by CPL Sections 170.45 and 210.45; and
 - C. In *People v D* [REDACTED] [REDACTED], Respondent conducted an unauthorized *ex parte* conversation with the defendant, who spoke limited English, and accepted a guilty plea without an official court interpreter or prosecutor present.

30. Respondent engaged in the foregoing conduct notwithstanding having been censured by the Commission in 2018, *inter alia*, for failing to be faithful to the law and maintaining professional competence in it.

Specifications to Charge II

31. In 2018, Respondent was censured by the Commission, *inter alia*, for failing to be faithful to the law and maintaining professional competence in it.

(Exhibit 1.)

People v T[REDACTED], M[REDACTED]

32. On or about December 26, 2023, Respondent presided over *People v T[REDACTED], M[REDACTED]*, in which the defendant was charged with speeding at 75 MPH in a 55-MPH zone, in violation of Vehicle and Traffic Law (“VTL”) §1180-b. A copy of the court’s file in the M[REDACTED] matter is appended as Exhibit 11.

33. During the appearance, and outside the presence of the prosecution, Respondent permitted the defendant to address the court regarding the facts and circumstances underlying the charge against him. The defendant stated he had no points on his license, worked for a medical device company which provided aortic grafts, and was speeding because he was delivering equipment to a hospital under emergency circumstances. A transcript of this proceeding is appended as Exhibit 12.

34. Based at least in part upon the defendant’s physical appearance and unsworn representations, Respondent dismissed the speeding charge, without notice to or consent of the prosecution. Respondent later explained to his clerk that the defendant was “dressed very professionally,” and “It was nice of him to come-- You know, coming the day after Christmas, and taking care of it.” He added, “and I guess I believed him. He was actually doing what he said.”

(Exhibit 12, p 6.)

People v B [REDACTED]. M [REDACTED]

35. On or about January 30, 2024, Respondent presided over *People v B [REDACTED]. M [REDACTED]*, in which the defendant was charged with moving from a lane unsafely, in violation of VTL §1128(a). A copy of the court's file in the M [REDACTED] matter is appended as Exhibit 13.

36. During the appearance, and outside the presence of the prosecution, Respondent solicited and received *ex parte* information from the defendant regarding the circumstances underlying the charge against him. Respondent repeatedly asked questions of the defendant and permitted him to disclose that, while on his way to work, he had been seriously injured in a motor vehicle accident associated with the ticket. The defendant further advised that he had not been speeding and that his driving record was "good." The defendant asserted that he was head of security at [REDACTED] in Oneonta, he had been previously employed as a sheriff's deputy in Massachusetts, his brother was Chief of Probation in Worcester, Massachusetts, and his nephew was Chief of Police in Montcalm, New Hampshire. A transcript of this proceeding is appended as Exhibit 14.

37. Based at least in part upon the defendant's unsworn representations, Respondent *sua sponte* dismissed the charge, without notice to or consent of the prosecution.

People v D [REDACTED] K [REDACTED]

38. On or about January 30, 2024, Respondent presided over *People v D [REDACTED] K [REDACTED]*, in which the defendant was issued a ticket for using a mobile telephone to engage in a call while such vehicle is in motion, in violation of VTL §1225-c(2)(a). A copy of the court's file in the K [REDACTED] matter is appended as Exhibit 15. A transcript of this proceeding is appended as Exhibit 16.

39. The defendant, who spoke primarily Ukrainian and only limited English, appeared without an attorney, but with an unidentified man who offered to translate for her. Without an official interpreter or the prosecution present, Respondent spoke to the defendant through the unidentified man, who did not speak Ukrainian himself, but stated that he was able to translate because he spoke Russian. At one point, Respondent explained to the defendant, "I'm half Ukrainian, so I understand some stuff." (Exhibit 16, p 6.)

40. Before asking the defendant how she pled to the charge, Respondent engaged in an *ex parte* conversation with the defendant and attempted to solicit an explanation of the circumstances of her cell phone use on the day in question. Respondent stated, "The court understands that you were on the phone with your

doctor” and asked, “What hospital was the doctor from?” and “the purpose of the call again, was?” (Exhibit 16, pp 2-4.) The defendant declined to elaborate on the substance of the conversation with her doctor and opted to plead guilty to the charge to avoid having to return to court. Respondent accepted the defendant’s guilty plea and assessed a fine.

41. By reason of the foregoing, Respondent should be disciplined for cause, pursuant to Article VI, Section 22, subdivision (a), of the Constitution and Section 44, subdivision 1, of the Judiciary Law, in that Respondent failed to uphold the integrity and independence of the judiciary by failing to maintain high standards of conduct so that the integrity and independence of the judiciary would be preserved, in violation of Section 100.1 of the Rules; failed to avoid impropriety and the appearance of impropriety, in that he failed to respect and comply with the law and failed to act in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary, in violation of Section 100.2(A) of the Rules; and failed to perform the duties of judicial office impartially and diligently, in that he failed to be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it, in violation of Section 100.3(B)(1) of the Rules, failed to perform the duties of judicial office without bias or prejudice against or in favor of any person, in violation of Section 100.3(B)(4) of the Rules, and failed to accord to every person who has a legal interest in a proceeding the right to be heard

according to law and initiated, permitted or considered *ex parte* communications, in violation of Section 100.3(B)(6) of the Rules.

CHARGE III

42. Notwithstanding that Respondent has been a judge since 2009, and was censured by the Commission in 2018 for, *inter alia*, failing to respect, comply with, be faithful to and maintain professional competence in the law, in testimony before the Commission on April 10, 2025, Respondent demonstrated a lack of understanding of basic legal principles and the proper role of a judge, as follows:

- A. When asked who handles the prosecution of traffic tickets in his court, Respondent asked “[w]hat is defined as the prosecution of traffic tickets?” When asked who “prosecutes” traffic tickets, he testified, “Me. I prosecute them.” (Exhibit 10, pp 10-11.)
- B. Notwithstanding the requirement that all town and village court proceedings be mechanically recorded,² Respondent disputed the necessity of doing so because he takes notes that he believes are “intricately detailed” and “indicate exactly what occurred” during appearances. (Exhibit 10, pp 17-18.)
- C. When asked about his failure to provide audio recordings requested by the Commission, Respondent testified that he cannot tell whether the recording device is working and that he requires additional training. (Exhibit 10, pp 19-20.)
- D. Respondent did not appear to know the statutory requirement that dismissal of a criminal charge must be in writing and on notice to the prosecution. When asked whether a judge should be faithful to a statutory requirement, Respondent said, “I think

that the Judge is faithful to the wellbeing and harmony within the community.” (Exhibit 10, p 57.)

- E. Respondent testified that he is able to judge the credibility of litigants based upon their physical appearance and the “thousand cases” he has handled. (Exhibit 10, pp 61-62.)
- F. Respondent failed to understand the impropriety of questioning a defendant about the facts of a case without a defense attorney or prosecutor present, and he failed to grasp the distinction between an admission of guilt by the defendant during colloquy and a guilty plea. (Exhibit 10, pp 69-71.)
- G. Respondent testified that if something is written on a traffic ticket by a law enforcement officer, “[t]hat makes it a fact.” When asked if the facts of a case have to be proven in court, Respondent said he relies on information written by law enforcement officers on traffic tickets. (Exhibit 10, pp 73-74.)

43. By reason of the foregoing, Respondent should be disciplined for cause, pursuant to Article VI, Section 22, subdivision (a), of the Constitution and Section 44, subdivision 1, of the Judiciary Law, in that Respondent failed to uphold the integrity and independence of the judiciary by failing to maintain high standards of conduct so that the integrity and independence of the judiciary would be preserved, in violation of Section 100.1 of the Rules; failed to avoid impropriety and the appearance of impropriety, in that he failed to respect and comply with the law and failed to act in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary, in violation of Section 100.2(A) of the Rules; and failed to perform the duties of judicial office impartially and

diligently, in that he failed to be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it, in violation of Section 100.3(B)(1) of the Rules.

WHEREFORE, by reason of the foregoing, the Commission should take whatever further action it deems appropriate in accordance with its powers under the Constitution and the Judiciary Law of the State of New York.





The respondent, John M. Skinner, a Justice of the Columbia Town Court,
Herkimer County, was served with a Formal Written Complaint dated February 14, 2018,
containing two charges. The Formal Written Complaint alleged that respondent delayed

and mishandled a small claims action and failed to mechanically record any court proceedings for more than eight years. Respondent filed an Answer dated April 10, 2018.

On June 6, 2018, the Administrator and respondent entered into an Agreed Statement of Facts pursuant to Section 44, subdivision 5, of the Judiciary Law, stipulating that the Commission make its determination based upon the agreed facts, recommending that respondent be censured and waiving further submissions and oral argument.

On June 13, 2018, the Commission accepted the Agreed Statement and made the following determination:

1. Respondent has been a Justice of the Columbia Town Court, Herkimer County, since 2009. His current term expires on December 31, 2020. Respondent is not an attorney.

As to Charge I of the Formal Written Complaint:

2. As set forth below, from May 2015 to November 2016, while presiding over *Erek Treen-Goff v Heidi Schimmelpfennig*, a small claims proceeding, respondent failed to be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it and failed to dispose of the matter promptly, efficiently and fairly, in that he: (A) unduly delayed holding a hearing and failed to decide the defendant's request for a jury trial until after he rendered judgment; (B) failed to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court pursuant to Section 1704 of the Uniform Justice Court Act; and (C) failed to mechanically record any appearances in the

matter, in violation of Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.

3. On April 14, 2015, Erek Treen-Goff filed a notice of small claim in the Columbia Town Court against Heidi Schimmelfennig. Mr. Treen-Goff sought \$3,000 plus \$15 court costs for damage caused to his vehicle, which he claimed was sustained when he swerved into a utility pole to avoid hitting Ms. Schimmelfennig's dog that had run into the road.

4. On April 14, 2015, Janet Elliott, the Town of Columbia court clerk, processed Mr. Treen-Goff's petition and set a hearing date for 6:00 PM on May 19, 2015.

5. On May 12, 2015, Ms. Schimmelfennig filed an "affidavit of facts" in the Columbia Town Court, demanded a jury trial and paid a jury fee in the amount of \$10 and a \$50 deposit. The affidavit was not notarized.

6. On May 19, 2015, respondent sent Ms. Schimmelfennig a letter requesting a notarized written demand for a jury trial and an affidavit of facts, among other items.

7. On June 1, 2015, Ms. Schimmelfennig re-filed a jury trial demand and "affidavit of facts." Neither the jury trial demand nor the affidavit was notarized.

8. From May 12, 2015, to August 20, 2016, respondent adjourned the hearing date at least three times, notwithstanding that neither Mr. Treen-Goff nor Ms. Schimmelfennig ever requested an adjournment.

9. Respondent failed to hold a hearing in the case until September 27, 2016. Present in the courtroom on that date were the plaintiff, the defendant, the

plaintiff's grandfather, Fred Treen, and the defendant's friend, Bob Meyer, who was an observer and did not intend to offer any testimony.

10. During the proceeding on September 27, 2016, the parties testified about the accident, and the plaintiff or his grandfather provided a police report and documentary evidence concerning repairs to Mr. Treen-Goff's vehicle.

11. At the conclusion of the proceeding on September 27, 2016, respondent adjourned the matter to provide the plaintiff with time to obtain records from the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation (NYSEG) specifying when the accident occurred and when the utility pole was replaced.

12. On October 11, 2016, the parties again appeared before respondent. Also present in the courtroom were the plaintiff's grandfather, Mr. Treen, and the defendant's son, Evan Schimmelfennig.

13. During the appearance, Mr. Treen provided respondent with weather reports from the date of the accident, handwritten statements from neighbors who had allegedly witnessed the defendant's dogs in the road, and a document from the utility company regarding repairs to the utility pole.

14. On October 11, 2016, respondent issued a judgment in favor of Mr. Treen-Goff, awarding him \$1,000 plus \$15 court costs.

15. On October 18, 2016, respondent sent Ms. Schimmelfennig a copy of the judgment. In a cover letter accompanying the judgment, respondent wrote that Ms. Schimmelfennig's motion for a jury trial was denied and he returned her \$50 deposit and \$10 filing fee.

16. On October 31, 2016, Ms. Schimmelfennig sent a Notice of Appeal to Mr. Treen-Goff and the Columbia Town Court by certified mail, signature required. The caption in the Notice of Appeal stated that the judgment was being appealed to the “Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Judicial Department,” although the Columbia Town Court is located in the Third Judicial Department and the proper forum for appeal of a town court decision is County Court.

17. On November 9, 2016, Ms. Schimmelfennig sent the Columbia Town Court a money order in the amount of \$101.50 and a \$5 cash filing fee. On November 29, 2016, respondent returned Ms. Schimmelfennig’s money order. He failed to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court, and he did not otherwise take any action on Ms. Schimmelfennig’s appeal.

18. During the pendency of *Treen-Goff v Schimmelfennig*, respondent failed to mechanically record any appearances in the case.

As to Charge II of the Formal Written Complaint:

19. From January 1, 2009, when he assumed judicial office, through May 23, 2017, respondent failed to mechanically record any appearances in the Columbia Town Court as required by Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.

20. Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge and Administrative Order 245/08 provide that every town and village justice must mechanically record all

proceedings in the court. The recording requirement became effective on June 16, 2008.

21. Respondent did not begin recording proceedings until after he was asked by the Commission during its investigation of the matters herein to provide audio recordings of appearances in *Treen-Goff v Schimmelpfennig*.

Additional Factors

22. Respondent acknowledges that he improperly delayed in holding a hearing in *Treen-Goff v Schimmelpfennig*. Prior to presiding over the matter, respondent had never received a small claims jury trial demand and did not know how to process the petition. Respondent avers that in the future he will immediately contact the Judicial Resource Center for assistance if he encounters a judicial issue that he cannot independently resolve.

23. Respondent also acknowledges that he did not mechanically record proceedings in his court prior to May 23, 2017. Respondent asserts that he did not know how to operate the laptop recorder, and until the Commission's inquiry he did not seek assistance in learning how to operate the recorder. Respondent also asserts that, notwithstanding the clear mandate of Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge and Administrative Order 245/08 that all proceedings be mechanically recorded, he believed his handwritten notes of proceedings were sufficient, even though he had not researched the matter and could point to no authority supporting his interpretation. After the Commission attempted to obtain audio recordings of proceedings in *Treen-Goff v Schimmelpfennig*, respondent received training from a local computer technician, which he acknowledges he could have done years before. Since May 2017, respondent has

complied with the mechanical recording requirement and pledges to continue to comply henceforth.

24. Respondent further acknowledges that it was improper to fail to take action on the defendant's appeal. Respondent states that he was awaiting the results of the Commission's investigation before acting on the appeal, but he now appreciates that it was inappropriate and unfair to the litigants to defer his judicial responsibilities in their case for so long, pending resolution of a disciplinary complaint against him. Respondent further states that he had never previously handled an appeal, but he assures the Commission that in the future he will consult with the Judicial Resource Center in a timely manner concerning his judicial obligations with regard to appeal procedures or any other matters that, as here, may confound him.

Upon the foregoing findings of fact, the Commission concludes as a matter of law that respondent violated Sections 100.1, 100.2(A), 100.3(B)(1), 100.3(B)(7) and 100.3(C)(1) of the Rules Governing Judicial Conduct ("Rules") and should be disciplined for cause, pursuant to Article 6, Section 22, subdivision (a), of the Constitution and Section 44, subdivision 1, of the Judiciary Law. Charges I and II of the Formal Written Complaint are sustained, and respondent's misconduct is established.

The record establishes that respondent inexcusably neglected his duties as a judge by failing to mechanically record any court proceedings for more than eight years, contrary to a statewide administrative order, and by unduly delaying a small claims matter in which he failed to hold a hearing until 17 months after a notice of claim was

filed. Respondent has acknowledged his responsibility for these ethical lapses.

Since 2008, town and village justices have been required to mechanically record all court proceedings pursuant to Administrative Order 245/08, issued pursuant to the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1). Despite this clear mandate, which went into effect shortly before he became a judge, respondent failed to record any proceedings in his court from the time he first took office and continuing for more than eight years. Respondent's claim that he "believed that his handwritten notes of proceedings were sufficient" suggests that he had at least some awareness of the recording requirement, and while he has explained that he "did not know how to operate the laptop recorder," which the court system had provided, his failure for more than eight years to seek assistance in learning to do so is plainly inexcusable. Not until after the Commission contacted him to ask for an audio recording of a particular proceeding did he seek training from a local computer technician and begin to comply with this important mandate.

The absence of a recording in any proceeding is significant since it not only makes it more difficult to determine what transpired at the proceeding but also indicates lack of compliance with an administrative order, which is inconsistent with a judge's ethical responsibilities (Rules, §100.3[C][1]). *See, e.g., Matter of Ridsdale*, 2012 NYSCJC Annual Report 148; *Matter of Allen*, 2012 NYSCJC Annual Report 64. While the cases that have come to the Commission's attention in this regard have generally involved judges who may have forgotten to turn on the recorder in isolated instances, did not ensure that the court staff had activated it or simply did not realize the equipment was not working, respondent's decision to simply ignore this important requirement by failing

to record any proceedings whatsoever was unprecedented and grossly improper.

Respondent was also responsible for significant delay in a small claims action that was filed in his court. By not holding a hearing until 17 months after the notice of claim was filed, he deprived the parties of the opportunity to have the claim resolved in a timely manner. *See Matter of Scolton*, 2008 NYSCJC Annual Report 209 (delays in scheduling a hearing and issuing decisions in six small claims actions); *Matter of Baldwin*, 2009 NYSCJC Annual Report 74 (significant delays in three small claims matters); *Matter of Trickler*, 2016 NYSCJC Annual Report 222 (ten-month delay in scheduling a trial in a case involving alleged violations of the Environmental Conservation Law).

The ethical standards require every judge to dispose of court matters “promptly, efficiently and fairly” (Rules, §100.3[B][7]). The “informal and simplified” procedures for small claims are intended to provide litigants with an efficient and just resolution to their legal disputes (Uniform Justice Court Act [“UCJA”] §1804). This goal is thwarted when a simple matter that could have been resolved expeditiously is delayed for over a year through no fault of the parties. *See Matter of Gilpatric*, 2011 NYSCJC Annual Report 97. A small claim is not insignificant to the parties involved, and for litigants whose cases may represent their only personal involvement with the courts, an unduly delayed resolution of their dispute would likely convey the impression that the judicial system is inefficient and insensitive to their concerns.

Here, respondent’s apparent uncertainty about how to process the defendant’s demand for a jury trial obviously does not excuse the excessive delay. While

respondent, who had never previously handled a small claims jury trial request, appears to have recognized that the defendant's unsworn submission did not meet the statutory requisite (*see* UJCA §1806; *Village of Castleton on the Hudson v Pillsworth*, 184 Misc2d 284, 285 [Sand Lake Justice Ct Rensselaer Co 2000]) and asked her to submit a notarized filing, it is unclear why he then inexplicably delayed and repeatedly adjourned the matter for over a year, instead of seeking guidance from the City, Town and Village Courts Resource Center.

After the defendant filed a notice of appeal in the matter, respondent further neglected his judicial responsibilities by failing to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court. Respondent's claim that he was awaiting the results of the Commission's investigation before acting on the appeal is patently unacceptable since he was required to comply with the statutory directives, and his unfamiliarity with appeal procedures does not excuse his failure to seek appropriate guidance. *See Matter of Ayres*, 30 NY3d 59 (2017) (judge failed to file the court's return in a timely manner despite multiple directives to do so from County Court). Respondent's failure to diligently discharge his judicial duties in the matter was contrary to ethical standards and statutory mandates, with adverse consequences not only to the litigants, but to public confidence in the administration of justice as a whole.

In accepting the jointly recommended sanction of censure, we note that respondent has acknowledged his misconduct and has assured the Commission that he will seek guidance from the Resource Center when needed, and we trust that he will diligently discharge his judicial duties in the future. We also take this opportunity to

remind all judges of the numerous resources provided by the court system that are available to them, including the Resource Center and the Advisory Committee on Judicial Ethics, when questions about procedures or their judicial responsibilities arise.


By reason of the foregoing, the Commission determines that the appropriate disposition is censure.

21 Q. All right. And did you review, as requested, the Court's files for -- there
22 were several matters listed in paragraph 3: *People v B █ G █*, *People*

24 *People v D █ K █*. Did you review those matters?

25 A. I reviewed those matters. If you have specific questions regarding those

19 Q. Okay. You're going to provide that name to us at a later date?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. When does the court meet?

22 A. Every Tuesday at six p.m. And the -- once a month, we have DA night,
23 and that is always the first Tuesday in the month. That is when the ADA
24 is there, and that is where I also have a Defense Lawyer. By the way, in
25 Herkimer County, I was the first one to get a full-time Defense Lawyer. I

1 got, you know, friends with a gentleman who lived in Cherry Valley, and
2 he agreed to come, because I was --

3 Q. Judge --

4 A. -- not the -- I would not do arraignments --

5 Q. I'm sorry, Judge. I have to --

6 A. -- without a Judge.

7 Q. -- I have to stop you, because I'm just trying to establish some
8 background information.

9 A. Go ahead.

10 Q. And I want to be as efficient as possible. So --

11 A. Very good.

12 Q. -- while I appreciate some detail -- well, what was the -- what is the name
13 of the Assistant District Attorney that appears in your court?

14 A. Eisenhut.

15 Q. Do you know the first name?

16 A. I believe it's Cliff. He's an ADA, Herkimer County ADA.

17 Q. And his night to appear is the first Tuesday of every month; is that right?

18 A. That's correct.

19 Q. That's correct?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. Who handles the prosecution of traffic tickets for the Town of Columbia?

22 A. What is defined as the prosecution of traffic tickets?

23 Q. Who handles state police tickets in your court?

24 A. The state police tickets are -- we just implanted a new system -- are on
25 the computer, which is up to date with the state records. The tickets

1 themselves are printed out by the Court Clerk and provided to me for that
2 particular evening. So for that evening, if there's six people that get
3 traffic tickets, he will have printed them out and give them to me. And
4 this is who we expect in court tonight. Then I'm given the court copies of
5 the tickets and expect those people that evening.

6 Q. Who prosecutes those tickets?

7 A. Who prosecutes them? Pardon me? Is that the --

8 Q. Yes.

9 A. -- question?

10 Q. That's the --

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. -- question.

13 A. Me. I prosecute them.

14 Q. But you're the Judge, correct?

15 A. I am the Judge.

16 Q. Are you telling us that you're the Judge and the Prosecutor in the case of
17 traffic tickets?

18 A. Oh, I'm sorry. The Prosecutor is the DA -- or is the -- Eisenhut. He's the
19 Prosecutor. The Defense Lawyer, it's Cliff Laughlin (phonetic). So I
20 have a Defense Lawyer available if needed -- generally not for traffic
21 tickets. And Eisenhut does -- he is the -- prosecutes all of them. He gets
22 copies of those and discusses the cases -- or no. I will arraign the
23 individual. He does not see them before I arraign them. In other words,
24 there's a first appearance. And if I get a not-guilty plea, he's in the back
25 room. Then I tell the individual to sit down; the District Attorney is

1 available for you here this evening to discuss the violation with. And
2 then the piece of paper is forwarded to the District Attorney from me.
3 And he calls them into the back room and discusses it.

4 Q. So my question to you was -- sorry to interrupt you, Judge -- but who
5 prosecutes the traffic tickets. And is your answer that Cliff Eisenhut, the
6 Assistant District Attorney, prosecutes the traffic tickets for the Town of
7 Columbia?

8 A. No. I'm telling -- I'm not sure what you mean, prosecute. What I'm
9 telling you is what he does. I get the copy of the traffic violation. I
10 arraign the individual and tell him or her their options. I'd say, "And
11 here's the charge that is against you."

12 Q. Let me rephrase it, Judge. Who represents the People of the State of New
13 York in traffic matters?

14 A. Oh, Eisenhut.

15 Q. Okay. That's the Prosecutor, right?

16 A. He's the Prosecutor. He's not the first person that sees them. I'm the first
17 person that sees them.

18 Q. But what relevance does that have?

19 A. He can't see them until he's been arraigned in front of me. The
20 arraignment is originally done in front of the Court, and then I --
21 typically, if I typically receive a not-guilty plea, then I tell the individual
22 that he may discuss it with the District Attorney, the Prosecutor. He can
23 discuss your violation with him. If I get a guilty plea, I adjudicate it
24 based on a guilty plea given there. So it doesn't get to the Prosecutor. It's
25 a speeding, I'm guilty, I proceed with the case as the individual -- the

1 individual had the option to plead guilty or not guilty.

2 Q. All right. We'll get back to some of the traffic matters we had some
3 questions about. But at this point, I'd like to change course a little bit.
4 What I have here is marked as Commission's Exhibit 2. This is a copy of
5 a determination by the Commission on Judicial Conduct dated June 26,
6 2018, and an agreed statement of fact dated May 15, 2018, signed by the
7 Judge. I just want -- Judge, do you remember being before the
8 Commission in connection with another matter that --

9 (Commission Exhibit 2 was marked for identification)

10 A. Right. I'm not in a position to review that without previously -- if you
11 want to discuss that, I am very pleased to do that. But without
12 previously --

13 Q. Judge --

14 A. -- going -- you're going to bring -- you're bringing up something that's
15 outside of the scope of the evaluation here.

16 Q. Judge, it's a simple question. Do you recall being before the
17 Commission --

18 A. I was -- I was before --

19 Q. You have to --

20 A. -- the Commission.

21 Q. -- let me finish the question, right, because we're being recorded. I'm
22 trying to protect the record for you and for the Commission.

23 A. Right. I --

24 Q. Do --

25 A. -- was -- the detail of exactly what occurred at that time --

1 Q. It's a yes --

2 A. -- I'm not in a --

3 Q. -- or no question. Do you recall being before the Commission in --

4 A. Yes.

5 Q. -- 2018? Do you recall the Commission accepting a censure with respect
6 to your --

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. -- handling -- please let me finish the question, okay, Judge? I'm doing
9 the best I can to get it out. Do you recall receiving a censure in
10 connection with your handling of a small-claims case?

11 A. Without saying that small-claims case, I'm not familiar with it.

12 Q. All right. Let's do this. Do you recall being before the Commission in
13 connection with a complaint that you failed to record court proceedings?

14 A. I believe so.

15 Q. And do you recall being censured for failing to record court proceedings?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. All right. And do you remember signing and entering into an agreed
18 statement of fact -- I'm showing you here the last page of Commission's
19 Exhibit 2. Is that your signature at the top of that document?

20 A. Yes, it is.

21 Q. Okay. Do you remember --

22 A. This was a -- this is a '18, and it's now '25. Okay.

23 Q. All right. But do you remember that they found misconduct on your part
24 in connection with your failure to record proceedings?

25 A. Right.

1 Q. All right. And I'm going to read to you a piece of this document -- a
2 portion of this document that you executed. It is the agreed statement of
3 fact, page 7, paragraph 26. "Respondent also acknowledges that he did
4 mechanically record proceedings in this court prior to May 23, 2017."
5 And at that point, you pledged to comply with the recording requirements
6 going forward. Do you remember that?

7 A. Yes.

8 Q. Okay.

9 MS. KLEIN: May I have this marked, please?

10 MR. FITZPATRICK: Um-hum.

11 BY MS. KLEIN:

12 Q. And do you understand, Judge, that there are laws, there are requirements
13 that a Judge record all proceedings before him or her?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. Okay. Are you currently doing that?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. I have here what's been marked as Commission's Exhibit 3. It is a five-
18 page document which encompasses correspondence between
19 Commission counsel and the Town of Columbia Justice Court, requesting
20 records in connection with the cases of *People v B* [REDACTED] *G* [REDACTED],
21 *G* [REDACTED] --

22 (Commission Exhibit 3 was marked for identification)

23 A. Yeah.

24 Q. -- and *People v B* [REDACTED] *G* [REDACTED]. Do you remember receiving requests
25 for records in connection with those two cases, Judge?

15.

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1 A. I believe so, yes.

2 Q. All right. And I will just note, with respect to this exhibit, that on March
3 19, 2024, Ms. Cenci received an email from Judge Skinner: "Attached,
4 please find a copy of the audio recording for March 5, 2024, as requested
5 in your letter to Millie Buck, Court Clerk, dated March 15, 2024. Copies
6 of all paper records will follow by US Postal Service. Please advise if
7 there is anything further you need from this Court." In response, by
8 email dated March 28, 2024, "Dear Judge Skinner" -- this is from
9 Cathleen Cenci to Judge Skinner -- "the Commission is in receipt of the
10 audio recording for March 5, 2024 and records of the two G [REDACTED] cases
11 that you provided, pursuant to our recent request. In addition to the
12 March 5th audio, also requested were recordings for all appearances held
13 in both G [REDACTED] cases on any other dates. Please provide the additional
14 recordings for these cases, either by mail or to the address provided by
15 the Commission." Do you remember that request coming through,
16 Judge?

17 A. I believe so.

18 Q. Do you want to see the exhibit so you know what we're talking about?

19 A. No.

20 Q. Okay.

21 A. Thank you.

22 Q. Did you provide the audio recordings in connection with the G [REDACTED]
23 matters to the Commission?

24 A. I believe so, but I'm not sure. Sometimes that recorder doesn't work the
25 way it should. I admit my ability in operating a recorder might be

16.

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1 marginal at times.

2 Q. Did you record any appearances in the G █████ cases that were requested
3 of you?

4 A. I don't know. There should've been some recordings on there. I'm not
5 sure -- are you asking a question that you didn't find any or --

6 Q. Well, Judge, we didn't receive a response. Why didn't we receive a
7 response to this email dated March 28, 2024, from Cathleen Cenci, our
8 Deputy Administrator in charge? There was no response. Where are the
9 recordings in the G █████ matters?

10 A. I can check the machine and see where they're at.

11 Q. Do you believe that you recorded the G █████ matters?

12 A. I can check -- I can check and see if they're on there or not. I did do the
13 G █████ matter; there's no question about that.

14 Q. Why would you not have checked before appearing today?

15 A. I wasn't requested. I thought you got all the copies you needed to do.

16 Q. Well, if we had all the copies -- the Commission had all the copies it
17 needed, why would we send you an additional request?

18 A. I'll check and see what is on the recorder.

19 Q. What do you want me to tell the Commission about your failure to
20 provide these recordings when you've previously been censured for that
21 conduct?

22 A. That's up to you.

23 Q. Do you think that's serious?

24 A. Pardon me?

25 Q. Do you think that is serious, that you're not providing recordings or

1 recording matters in your court?

2 A. I'm attempting to record the thing on that darn recorder appropriately.

3 Q. I asked you a yes-or-no question. Do you think it's serious?

4 A. I'm not sure the question is serious.

5 Q. Would you agree with me that if you fail to record a court proceeding, it
6 makes it more difficult, if not impossible, to determine what transpired
7 during that proceeding?

8 A. I would say not at all.

9 Q. And why is --

10 A. Because if you pull that complete file, the notes on that file are intricately
11 detailed and indicate exactly what occurred at the proceeding.

12 Q. Are you saying that you take notes that are adequate so that you don't
13 need to record cases?

14 A. I didn't say that. I said, I take notes so that if I'm ever pulled and I pull
15 files from many years before and pull that file, look at that yellow copy
16 and determine exactly what occurred on that, because I take the time to
17 write down everything that was discussed.

18 Q. Is that what happened in the G [REDACTED] cases?

19 A. It may have. I don't know. I'd have to check the recording.

20 Q. Well, we're going to look at their records in a moment, and you're going
21 to tell me exactly what happened, I hope, from your notes, because we
22 don't have a recording.

23 A. Okay.

24 Q. Do you think -- do you agree with me that failure to record an appearance
25 indicates a lack of compliance with an administrative order, which is

18.

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1 inconsistent with a Judge's ethical responsibility?

2 A. I'm not making all that comment. My --

3 Q. Judge --

4 A. -- my important thing -- this is my important thing. The person that sits
5 across from me, the defendant, is the most important person in that
6 courtroom. The discussion between the Judge to indicate to that person
7 exactly what the charges are and what the person's options are are
8 paramount to effectively handling the case. I ensure him -- assure him of
9 that procedure, that if you do this, this happens; if you do that, that
10 happens, from the simplest traffic ticket to the most complicated
11 situation. The person that's there doesn't want to be there. The person's
12 there, I want to make them feel comfortable that we're here to process --
13 in front of me is paperwork that clearly shows a specific charge to you.
14 I'm going to read that charge to you in detail and make sure you're fully
15 aware of the charge and fully aware of the options if you plead guilty or
16 not guilty to the charge. I'm not suggesting -- I'm not giving them any
17 lawyer advice.

18 Q. Excuse me, Judge. I have to stop you. What does this have to do with
19 your failure to record proceeding?

20 A. Well, I admit that I'm probably not as good as I should be at recording.

21 Q. Why is that?

22 A. It's the -- there's a issue handling the darn recorder. I put it on, and I say,
23 "I wonder if I have this correct or not." So I need -- and when I've asked
24 for advice or people to come out and do it, I never see anybody from
25 Albany up there to tell me how to do it.

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1 Q. When did you ask for advice?

2 A. On probably several occasions. But --

3 Q. Can --

4 A. -- if somebody would come and clearly go over that with me, again, so I
5 can handwrite exactly what needs to be done in respect, specifically, to
6 recording, and then do an example of that procedure in detail, and then go
7 over that with me, I would appreciate that entirely.

8 Q. So are you telling the Commission that you lack training to record these
9 matters?

10 A. No. I'm telling you that I need additional training.

11 Q. I will note that, in response to our request for records in connection with
12 the G █████ matter, Judge, you were able to forward, as per your email
13 dated March 19, 2024, 6:09 p.m., "Attached, please find a copy of the
14 audio recording for March 5, 2024, as requested in your letter to Millie
15 Buck" --

16 A. But that there, did you receive that?

17 Q. We did receive that recording from March --

18 A. Thank you.

19 Q. -- can I finish, Judge -- from March 5, 2024. We did receive that.

20 However, that was not the G █████ -- *People v B █████ G █████* or *People v*
21 *B █████ G █████*. That was an appearance by a J █████ T █████, who was
22 not the defendant in the case. So why did we receive a recording from
23 March 5, 2024, and no recordings in connection with B █████ G █████ or
24 B █████ G █████?

25 A. For which date?

20.

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1 Q. Why did we receive March 5, 2024, which pertains to J [REDACTED] T [REDACTED], and
2 not the G [REDACTED] matters?

3 A. Was there -- that the G [REDACTED] k matter on the same date?

4 Q. You would have to tell me that, Judge.

5 A. We're talking about a matter on March 5, 2024. Are we talking about
6 another matter by the G [REDACTED] on a different date?

7 Q. Yes.

8 A. I'd have to check the recorder as to exactly when that date was that that
9 occurred.

10 Q. Why didn't you do that before today?

11 A. I thought somebody come and got all the recordings.

12 Q. Did you delete any recordings in connection with these cases?

13 A. I don't delete no recordings, none, ever.

14 Q. I just have to ask, Judge. It's --

15 A. Pardon me?

16 Q. I have to ask you that question, because --

17 A. All right. No, no, I do not.

18 Q. -- this has been pending for months, and you're saying you're going to go
19 back and check the recorder. I'm just trying to give you the opportunity,
20 explain to the Commission why we don't have these things.

21 A. Okay.

22 Q. Especially when, in 2018, you were censured for failing to record things.
23 Now I have to go back to the Commission and give your explanation, and
24 I'm not clear on it, except that you say you need more training. All right.
25 Let's move on.

21.

(Hon. John M. Skinner)

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MS. KLEIN: Could you please mark this?

BY MS. KLEIN:

Q. All right. I've asked Mr. Fitzpatrick to mark as Commission's Exhibit 4 records received from the Town of Columbia Justice Court in response to our request for records in connection with the B ■ G ■ matter. It is a -- well, it indicates that animal control, on 12/20/23 -- that's December 20, 2023 -- issued an appearance ticket to B ■ G ■ for a dog at large violation of local law, 2010, number 1, section 5, in the Town of Columbia; and in violation of Article 7 of the Ag and Markets Law. Judge, would you just take a moment, look at those records? Those are records that your Court Clerk sent us in response to our request for records on B ■ G ■.

(Commission Exhibit 4 was marked for identification)

A. These are not clear, and I can't read those, these two documents. Oh, and then Mr. T ■'s statement that can -- I see Mr. T ■'s statement, yes. This appearance notice is rather vague. Thank you.

Q. First of all, do you know who the Town of Columbia animal control officer is that signed this document?

A. I know of him. I don't know him personally.

Q. Do you know his name?

A. No. They just changed him, too. I'm not sure who it was at that particular time.

Q. All right. Well, I'll just note that this appearance ticket issued by the Town of Columbia Animal Control gave B ■ G ■ an appearance date of January 9, 2024, at six p.m. He was asked to appear in your court on

22.

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1 January 9, 2024. Did he appear at that time?

2 A. I believe so.

3 Q. Well, this is your Court's file. I'm showing you -- I'll show you page 5 of
4 Exhibit 4, Town of Columbia dog complaint form filled out by J [REDACTED]
5 T [REDACTED]. There are notes in the margin, dated 1/9/2024, "Deer carcass in
6 neighbor yard. T [REDACTED] harvested deer, question mark, on hold," and then,
7 "reschedule 3/19." Would you take a look at that, please, Judge, those
8 notes on the right margin? Are those your notes?

9 A. Those are my notes.

10 Q. All right. What do they mean? What do they pertain to?

11 A. They clearly pertain to why the dogs were out.

12 Q. I'm sorry. They clearly pertain? Is that --

13 A. The dogs were out and visited the carcasses that were on the T [REDACTED]
14 property.

15 Q. Did B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] appear on January 9, 2024, based on your records?

16 A. The record indicate the date. You've got that indicated. He did appear.
17 To say -- for me to tell you exactly that date, it's on the record as shown.
18 He did appear, and I did adjudicate that dog violation, based on his
19 appearance. Yes, I did.

20 Q. Tell me what occurred during the appearance.

21 A. What occurred during the -- at the appearance, the G [REDACTED] provided
22 pictures of deer on the T [REDACTED] property, dead deer -- not live deer, dead
23 deer. I'm a lifelong deer hunter. They were recently shot deer. They
24 were not tagged. They were without antlers. And they were on adjacent
25 property, and they were not attended by any individual. So they were

23.

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1 dead deer, shot adjacent to the G [REDACTED] property. And when the dogs
2 went out the door, they went over to those deer. And that was a -- that
3 resulted in the trespassing charge by Mr. T [REDACTED].

4 Q. The allegation against B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED], as I understand it from the records
5 provided by the Court, is that he was ticketed with dog at large in
6 connection with pit bulls -- his pit bulls running loose on J [REDACTED] T [REDACTED]'s
7 neighboring property; is that right?

8 A. That's a statement that Mr. G [REDACTED] made, I believe. That's right. That's
9 what he did.

10 Q. That's the complaint, right?

11 A. Yes.

12 Q. Was Mr. G [REDACTED] arraigned on that charge?

13 A. He was arraigned on that charge, yes.

14 Q. How do we know that?

15 A. On his visit -- on his visit there, he appeared by virtue of the ticket issued
16 by the Dog Warden. So he was arraigned and adjudicated at that
17 appearance.

18 Q. Did Mr. G [REDACTED] have an Attorney when he appeared?

19 A. No.

20 Q. Who was present?

21 A. He was present. My Court Clerk was present. And I believe his wife
22 was present.

23 Q. Whose wife?

24 A. G [REDACTED]'s wife.

25 Q. What's her name?

24.

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1 A. I don't know her name.

2 Q. Was anyone else in the courtroom?

3 A. Not that I know of.

4 Q. Not that you know of, or you don't --

5 A. No.

6 Q. -- recall?

7 A. There was nobody else in the courtroom. I recall those two people, my
8 Court Clerk, and myself in the courtroom. We're reconciling and
9 recognizing something that occurred 16 months ago. And that's what I
10 recall.

11 Q. What happened after you arraigned Mr. G [REDACTED]?

12 A. I adjudicated that case based on the input that Mr. G [REDACTED] provided me
13 about his dogs going out the door and running off of his property onto the
14 adjacent property, apparently, Mr. T [REDACTED]'s property, where the dead deer
15 were. The reason that I determined that they actually went onto the
16 adjacent property were the physical distance of the deer on that property.

17 Q. Did Mr. G [REDACTED] enter a plea of guilty or not guilty to the dog at large
18 charge?

19 A. Not guilty.

20 Q. How did it come about that you started discussing the deer on the
21 neighbor's property during this appearance?

22 A. The first thing they showed me, the G [REDACTED] property, was pictures of the
23 deer, stating that their -- when their dogs left the house, the reason that
24 they went to that location were a result of these deer that they -- pictures
25 they showed me. They were not provided by the Dog Warden or

25.

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1 anybody like that. They were provided by the G [REDACTED].

2 Q. Why were you looking at these pictures?

3 A. I was looking at the pictures because they came in to answer why their
4 dogs were over there. And their reason for -- the dogs were over there
5 was, the existence of deer, and they wanted to prove to me there were
6 deer on the adjacent property -- dead deer on the adjacent property, not
7 tagged, not processed. There were dead deer on the property. They were
8 clearly shot.

9 Q. What date were the photos from?

10 A. Oh, I don't know. The photos were -- the photos were taken by the
11 G [REDACTED] previous to -- probably the date that the dogs left their premise
12 and went over there or thereabouts. I'm not sure of the exact date that the
13 pictures were taken.

14 Q. Was this a trial?

15 A. No. It was an evaluation of their violation charge of being on adjacent
16 property. And they were explaining why their dogs were on adjacent
17 property.

18 Q. Why did you permit them to explain facts related to the case as they saw
19 it without the other party present?

20 A. The other party was invited there. He didn't have to be there.

21 Q. I don't know what that means. Please explain it.

22 A. The Dog Warden said, "You can be there, but you don't have to be there."

23 Q. Was this a trial?

24 A. Just like doing a traffic tickets, an -- it's evaluation of the situation.

25 Q. Are you supposed to be evaluating facts when you're doing an

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1 arraignment, Judge?

2 A. I'm not doing -- I'm not doing an arraignment. I'm doing the -- in an
3 efficient manner, handling the case appropriately.

4 Q. What's your --

5 A. In other words --

6 Q. -- statutory --

7 A. -- in other words, the --

8 Q. -- basis for --

9 A. -- the reason --

10 Q. Stop. What's your statutory basis for considering evidence outside of the
11 other party and the Prosecution? What permits you to do that? Do you
12 see anything wrong with that?

13 A. The only thing I see is -- I have two people come -- I have papers in front
14 of me that people -- these people are charged with dogs at large. I come
15 in and explain, "You've been charged with dogs at large." The next step,
16 they lay pictures in front of me, saying, "This is why our dogs were at
17 large." That's what they did.

18 Q. This file provided by the court, as per Exhibit 4, references tickets issued
19 to B ■ G ■ in November 21, 2023, for dogs at large, and ticket issued
20 on December 20, 2023. So there were two sets of tickets issued to B ■
21 G ■ in connection with loose pit bulls, right?

22 A. I believe so.

23 Q. All right. So which case were you discussing when he showed you these
24 pictures?

25 A. Well, I have to have both cases in front of me to determine that.

27.

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1 Q. Well, this is your file.

2 A. Well, thank you. I'm discussing the case when the carcasses were there,
3 whatever that case is.

4 Q. Are there pictures --

5 A. But that's the case -- that's the clear cases that I'm discussing.

6 Q. Okay. Are there pictures of the carcasses in your Court's file?

7 A. No. They were provided -- they were kept, because they didn't know if
8 they wanted to turn them into the DEC. I said, "Well, that's not anything
9 we would suggest. That's your option as a neighbor," because the deer
10 were clearly shot deer, untagged deer, unattended deer.

11 Q. What does your note mean here in the Court's file, "Harvested deer,
12 question mark"?

13 A. Just exactly that, that if you harvest a deer, you do not abandon the deer.
14 You should have -- if there's deer there that have been harvested,
15 somebody needs to be with them. As a lifelong deer hunter, you don't
16 abandon the deer. It's your responsibility to tag the deer appropriately,
17 process the deer appropriately, and move the deer appropriately. Those
18 deer are laying on Mr. T■■■■'s property with nobody there. The reason I
19 say that is, that's the first thing they -- they used that as why their darn
20 dogs were over there. That's what they -- that's what they -- "our dogs
21 were over there because of this."

22 Q. And when did Mr. T■■■■ get to present his version of events?

23 A. He had an -- he had an -- he had an opportunity to do that at that time.

24 Q. How so?

25 A. He's invited to, and he decided to come -- not to come.

28.

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1 Q. How was he invited?

2 A. He's invited by the Dog Warden as part of the issue that -- and he asked
3 the Dog Warden if he needed to be there. And the Dog Warden told him
4 he didn't need to be there.

5 Q. Well, was it a trial?

6 A. It was an evaluation --

7 Q. Was it a trial? I don't know what this evaluation is that you're referring
8 to. Was it a trial?

9 A. Well, then you got to define exactly what a trial is to me. I have in front
10 of me this paperwork. The paperwork, as indicated, is issued by the Dog
11 Warden. The Dog Warden forwards the paperwork to the court. So what
12 I have in front of me is dog at large violations by this individual with a
13 specific appearance date. That's all the court knows until the individual
14 comes out. So the individual had to come in, pled not guilty to the
15 charge, and show me what -- and showed me pictures. I don't know if I
16 should've looked at the pictures or not at that particular time. But at that
17 time -- and they immediately said, you know, "We want to tell you what
18 our dog -- why our dog was doing this. That's what we want to do."

19 Q. But you never gave the other side the opportunity to tell their version of
20 events, correct?

21 A. They had an opportunity to be there just as much as the other -- as the
22 defendant did.

23 Q. Was Mr. T [REDACTED] required to be there?

24 A. No, he was not required to be there.

25 Q. Did you issue a finding on this day?

29.

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1 A. Pardon me?

2 Q. Did you issue a finding on this day? Did you take any action with respect
3 to this case on January 9, 2024?

4 A. I believe I -- I don't know. What's the note say? Thank you. These
5 individuals were told by the Court to keep their dogs off of the property --

6 Q. Um-hum.

7 A. -- and that there would be a necessary follow-up if needed, being
8 following that -- or without that -- or you know, following that. Since
9 that particular time, I don't believe there's any other correspondence since
10 that time, which is a year ago -- more than a year ago. They were clearly
11 told to keep their dogs on their property. That was the instruction
12 provided by the Court.

13 Q. Did you dismiss the case?

14 A. No. I give them -- I don't think that's dismissing. That's giving them a
15 specific instruction by virtue of what occurred.

16 Q. Where does your notes say that?

17 A. Where's what?

18 Q. What do your notes say?

19 A. Dismissed in a respective of no fines, but they were given specific
20 instructions to keep the dogs at home. And even recommendations for
21 fencing, they were given there. Thank you.

22 Q. So did you dismiss the dog at large case on January 9, 2024?

23 A. I give them instructions to keep their dog on their side. To dismiss the
24 case would indicate that they weren't doing anything wrong. I didn't say
25 they weren't doing anything wrong. The dogs were on the adjacent

30.

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1 property. There's no question about that. That's why I give them
2 instruction to keep them at home. Since that particular time, I heard
3 nothing since that particular time.

4 Q. I'm going to ask you a yes-or-no question. Did you dismiss the dog at
5 large case against B ■ G ■?

6 A. No.

7 Q. Then why does it say --

8 A. Well, it says "dismissed", but it -- in reality, I gave them instructions on
9 what to do, okay? Maybe that is not appropriate term. Dismiss means
10 whatever they were doing was okay. That's what this must mean. That is
11 not true. Fact is, they were told to keep the darn dogs on the property.

12 Q. On what authority did you order the G ■ to do anything if there's no
13 charges, charges are dismissed?

14 A. There is a charge -- you can see a note that might say "dismissed". And
15 that -- and exactly, you're going to show me that. That's okay. Don't
16 show it to me.

17 Q. Okay. Is that your handwriting?

18 A. Yeah.

19 Q. Are those your initials?

20 A. No, I'm seeing it. Thank you --

21 Q. I'm asking --

22 A. -- very much.

23 Q. -- you. Is that your handwriting?

24 A. That is -- you asked if it said "dismissed". It was dismissed with the
25 instructions to keep the dog at home.

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1 Q. Okay.

2 A. It --

3 Q. So --

4 A. -- it was -- you might say, "Well, what does dismiss mean?" Dismiss
5 means, everything you're doing was okay. That's not true at all. Their
6 dogs running around is inappropriate. There's no question about that.

7 Q. What's your statutory authority for dismissing the charge with
8 instructions?

9 A. I don't know what the statutory authority is.

10 Q. Shouldn't you?

11 A. I didn't --

12 Q. How long have you been a Judge?

13 A. I didn't dismiss the -- to dismiss a case means that you specifically say
14 that whatever you were doing is okay. I did not do that. So you're asking
15 me -- you're asking me a question to say, "Well, if you said dismissed,
16 that means whatever they were doing was appropriate." It was not
17 appropriate for their dogs to be on adjacent property. That's a fact. The
18 fact then was given that I told them to keep the darn dogs at home, even
19 though there were dead deer laying, which were -- which is a total other
20 issue.

21 Q. Were there --

22 A. But I determined -- excuse me. I'm sorry.

23 Q. No, go ahead.

24 A. But I determined that going on the adjacent property by the dogs was a
25 result of the deer -- the dead deer laying -- it's like deer laying in my yard

32.



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1 next to my property, not in my yard, but in my neighbor's yard over there.

2 They're laying over there. So they let -- they opened the door, and the

3 darn dogs run over, which they wouldn't normally do.

4 Q. Do you know what *ex parte* communication is?

5 A. Absolutely.

6 Q. Were you considering these photographs, purportedly of J [REDACTED] T [REDACTED]'s

7 property, *ex parte*?

8 A. No. They're providing evidence of why their dogs were there.

9 Q. What does *ex parte* mean?

10 A. Ma'am, I know what it means.

11 Q. Did you swear B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] in that day?

12 A. I believe so, yes.

13 Q. Did he --

14 A. All of them were swore[d] [sic] in at the beginning of court sessions,
15 rather than restating it each time.

16 Q. And you recorded this proceeding?

17 A. I believe so, but I -- no, I told you that, that I had to check the recorder in
18 respect that.

19 Q. You think that J [REDACTED] T [REDACTED] should be investigated for the deer
20 carcasses?

21 A. I'm not in a position to make that recommendation. What I see -- I am in
22 a position, because I'm a lifelong deer hunter. I know exactly how deer
23 ought to be handled.

24 Q. Okay.

25 A. They were not handled in appropriate fashion. They were dead deer,

33.

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1 laying on adjacent property, definitely shot, not cleaned out, not taken
2 care of, not attended or -- by anybody. Any time I've ever harvest a
3 deer -- I've harvested a few -- I was always with that animal. It's my
4 responsibility to appropriately tag that animal and transport that animal
5 appropriately. For a deer to be laying shot dead in the open field --

6 Q. How do you know that they were J ■■■ T ■■■'s deer?

7 A. All I know was they were on his property.

8 Q. How do you know?

9 A. The defendants said, "That's his property over there, where my dogs
10 went." And the dogs -- and where the dogs went is where the deer were.

11 Q. So that makes it a fact?

12 A. That's what was offered in court when they come in, said -- when they
13 told me that the dogs had went out, because his -- their property is
14 immediately adjacent to the T ■■■ property. I don't believe the T ■■■
15 property is their homestead. I don't think there was a home there. I think
16 there was just land there. At least -- let's say this. The pictures did not
17 show any facility there, just vacant land, which is reputedly immediately
18 adjacent to the defendant's property. And there --

19 Q. Just --

20 A. -- is no barriers between the two, even tree lines or anything that is, you
21 know, relatively close neighbor.

22 Q. Did B ■■ G ■■■ make any further appearances in this matter?

23 A. Not that I know of, no.

24 Q. And that's because it was dismissed with instruction, correct?

25 A. Yes.

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1 Q. And just so the Commission's aware, what is your statutory -- your legal
2 basis for dismissing the charges, just -- I'm giving you the opportunity to
3 explain to the Commission why --

4 A. Right.

5 Q. -- it is.

6 A. The charges -- we're making a statement with instructions and at the same
7 time saying it was dismissed. Well, I guess I can't be dismissed if you
8 got instructions, because if it was dismissed, it would not have any
9 instructions. But appropriate instructions were given about keeping the
10 darn dogs off of the property, on your side of the fence -- not fence --
11 pardon me. There were no -- there were no fence there. Keep them on
12 your side. Now, they -- who knows what the dogs would've done if there
13 were no deer there. The generation of the visit to the adjacent property
14 was a result of the deer being there.

15 Q. Do you see anything wrong with how you handled *People v B* G
16 as you sit here today in connection with that dog at large case?

17 A. No. I clearly indicated that there is definite complaint, and they clearly
18 indicated why the dog was on the property.

19 Q. With no input from the complainant, right?

20 A. With the complainant be fully invited to attend at the same time.

21 Subsequently, I understand the deer were removed, but I don't know who
22 removed them. I know the G didn't touch them.

23 Q. Do you have something against J T?

24 A. I have absolutely nothing against J T, other than he is -- I
25 adjudicate him exactly like everybody else. Do I like him? The answer

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1 is, no, I don't like him. Why? He has belittled my complete family in
2 front of the town board.

3 Q. When did that --

4 A. When I was at the town board doing a presentation of books, he comes in,
5 and not at a gentleman's pace, at a screaming pace, tells me, "You
6 shouldn't be the Judge, and the Skinner family just should not be involved
7 with that. They" -- and all of the -- and I didn't say a word. I invited him
8 back to court to further discuss the outcome of the dog case. And he did
9 come back --

10 Q. All right.

11 A. -- but I wouldn't do that without having state police there. I'm concerned
12 about --

13 Q. I'm going to stop you, because --

14 A. Okay.

15 Q. -- I'm going to get to your having him appear --

16 A. Okay. Thank you.

17 Q. -- in the court. We'll get to that.

18 A. All righty. Very good.

19 Q. Thank you. At this point, I have asked Mr. Fitzpatrick to mark as Exhibit
20 5 what the Commission received from Columbia Town Court as the
21 Court's file in connection with the matter of *People v B* [REDACTED] *G* [REDACTED].
22 It's a three-page document with an undated letter from Tpr. Flynn to the
23 Judge, an information, and a statement from J [REDACTED] T [REDACTED]. Page 1 reads
24 as follows -- this is the letter from Tpr. Flynn -- "Your Honor, please see
25 the enclosed, requesting a criminal summons for a trespassing against

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1 B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED], [REDACTED]. The complainant is J [REDACTED] T [REDACTED],
2 [REDACTED]. G [REDACTED] entered his property on December 31, 2023, without
3 his permission and took a picture of deer carcass on T [REDACTED]'s property.
4 Please let me know if you have any questions with the matter. I can be
5 reached on my cell at [REDACTED]. Respectfully, Tpr. Flynn." Is this
6 the Court's file, Judge?

7 (Commission Exhibit 5 was marked for identification)

8 A. Thank you. Do you have that -- they asked for a criminal summons. It
9 was denied. But they actually -- but the state police didn't want to pursue
10 it. I know that besides, but it's officially on that document that it was
11 denied.

12 Q. So what did you do with Tpr. Flynn's request for a criminal summons?

13 A. It says right there. It was denied, but there were subsequent discussions
14 with the Trooper in respect to that.

15 Q. Is that your handwriting saying, "criminal summons -- CS denied,
16 criminal summons denied"?

17 A. Yes. That's what I indicated, officially.

18 Q. And that's your signature?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. Case closed?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. All that?

23 A. Yes, ma'am.

24 Q. When did you do that?

25 A. I don't know. Is it dated?

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1 Q. Page 2 has another CS denied, John M. Skinner, JM, 1/4/24. Is that when
2 you -- is January 4, 2024, when you denied Tpr. Flynn's request for a
3 criminal summons?

4 A. It was after discussions with Tpr. Flynn.

5 Q. I asked you, Judge, is that when --

6 A. It's exactly --

7 Q. -- you dismissed --

8 A. -- what it says. So you're saying -- it did say "case denied" and the date
9 of 1/4/24. That is correct.

10 Q. I'm asking you if that's the date you denied the criminal summons. I don't
11 know from looking at it because the date is there that that's when you did
12 it. Is that when you did it?

13 A. The note is above, my initials are below, and the date is indicated. So the
14 date is indicated --

15 Q. How about a yes or a no? Is that the date the --

16 A. Exactly the way it's indicated on this document. Yes. That's the date it
17 was --

18 Q. Why? Why did you deny this criminal summons?

19 A. It was discussions with the Trooper.

20 Q. What discussions?

21 A. Brief discussions, because he was requesting the criminal summons be
22 issued. They were -- you know, they overlay each other, these particular
23 charges associated with the trespassing or the dogs at large things.

24 Q. Was this complaint -- was this information facially sufficient under the
25 law?

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1 A. I don't know.

2 Q. Why don't --

3 A. It was --

4 Q. -- you know?

5 A. -- it was -- it was sufficient -- he was trying to get a signature from me to
6 issue a criminal summons and then really decided not to do it.

7 Q. Why?

8 A. Ask him. Ask the State Trooper. I concur with it.

9 Q. Judge, you're --

10 A. It was an -- it was an open request by the state police, pending their
11 review of the thing, and then they decided not to. So I officially put --
12 even though it looks like an appearance of an official request -- denied
13 the summons for the -- for that.

14 Q. On what legal basis did you deny the Trooper's request for a criminal
15 summons?

16 A. If the state police aren't pursuing it or want to get it signed, I'm not signing
17 it. They aren't officially requesting it.

18 Q. Where does it reflect that in the Court's file?

19 A. Pardon me?

20 Q. Where does it reflect that the state police don't want this summons in the
21 Court's file?

22 A. The discussions that I had with the state police. Let me just -- may I see
23 it again? Thank you.

24 Q. Sure.

25 A. Really, we need to look at the dates specifically with the -- they overlay

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1 each other, this request and the dates that the G ██████ actually came in.
2 The timing of all of that is an issue. But I know they decided they didn't
3 want to do it. And I concurred with it, and that's why I denied it.

4 Q. You think that was proper?

5 A. It's up to law enforcement to determine -- make the final determination
6 whether they want to issue a criminal summons. If he'd have said, "Yes, I
7 do," I would've signed it. Didn't say that.

8 Q. Where did this --

9 A. Thank you for showing it.

10 Q. -- where did this discussion take place? I'm assuming you're talking
11 about -- you had discussions with Tpr. Flynn, correct?

12 A. Yeah. I believe it was at the troopers' barracks.

13 Q. Tell me how that came about.

14 A. I attend the trooper barracks about once a month, just to get an update on
15 tickets and information, stuff like that.

16 Q. So when did you go to the trooper barracks on this case?

17 A. Well, I don't know for sure what that was. What's the date on this darn
18 thing here? I may have been there on 1/4. That's the date that -- 1/4/24 --
19 the date that I denied it. I don't have an official --

20 Q. Well --

21 A. -- recollection of -- but it is very official --

22 Q. Let me ask you this.

23 A. -- that I denied this thing --

24 Q. Was it --

25 A. -- on 1/4 of 2024.

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1 Q. Why is it official, because you made that note?

2 A. That's when I -- that's when I denied it, so that I got a record in my file
3 that I denied it, but in fact, they didn't want to pursue at the same time.

4 Q. Was your conversation with Tpr. Flynn face to face?

5 A. Yes.

6 Q. And it took place at the barracks?

7 A. Pardon me? I believe so, yes.

8 Q. All right. Tell me what happened during that -- what'd he tell you -- he or
9 she?

10 A. He decided he didn't want to pursue it.

11 Q. Why?

12 A. And I said, you know, "I'm" -- you know why I was there? To hand him
13 that sign. And he said, "I don't want to pursue it." And I said, "Okay."

14 Q. To hand what --

15 A. I'm not making a judgment on whether they formulate a criminal
16 summons or not. It's premature for me to make any judgments in that
17 respect. And he said -- I said, "I know you put it in writing." He said --

18 Q. You were there to hand him what? What did you say you were there to
19 hand him?

20 A. Oh, I'd be there on several cases.

21 Q. Why? Why are you going to the state police barracks to discuss cases?

22 A. I don't discuss cases at all.

23 Q. What do you do?

24 A. I don't under -- do you understand that? Again, I don't discuss cases. I
25 make sure I have the appropriate paperwork required for the court to

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1 process that. Now, up until recently, with the court change and the way
2 we -- and updating the court procedures, we were getting them hand-
3 delivered by the state police. So at this point, from 1/1/25 until now,
4 we're on the current system. And the violations -- every week, the Court
5 Clerk gives me a copy of each violation that is due this evening. The
6 only thing that I do in respect to the state police on that is I request from
7 the state police that they schedule them to appear on DA night for
8 efficiency purposes so that we cannot require an individual -- an
9 individual can clearly clear the case up in one visit.

10 Q. I'm going to stop you, Judge. Why are you going to the state police
11 barracks to review cases?

12 A. I don't review cases.

13 Q. Then what are you doing?

14 A. I'm picking --

15 Q. What are you doing at the state police barracks?

16 A. I'm getting copies of -- making sure I got the correct copies. I don't
17 discuss any cases.

18 Q. Okay.

19 A. No cases are ever discussed with the state police.

20 Q. All right. Thank you. Except for --

21 A. That is --

22 Q. -- except for --

23 A. -- that is --

24 Q. -- this case --

25 A. -- improper --

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1 Q. -- right here?

2 A. -- inappropriate, and I should never do that. But it is appropriate that I
3 get the required paperwork to handle the case with the defendant. That is
4 entirely appropriate. And up until now -- now, officially, I'm getting
5 them with the current system, and they can be printed out. And I still tell
6 the state police, "Schedule them to come in on DA night," because that is
7 the most efficient way to handle it, given that a typical traffic ticket, they
8 may plead not guilty to it, and the DA is standing over here, and --

9 Q. I have to stop you, Judge. You've gone --

10 A. Thank you.

11 Q. -- off as to why you were there. So let's just -- did there come a time
12 when B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] appeared in the court?

13 A. We discussed that. Did we, or is that another G [REDACTED]?

14 Q. Well, I'm saying, did he appear in the court on the same date as B [REDACTED]
15 G [REDACTED], on January 9th?

16 A. I'd have to take a look at the records. I think it was. I think it was, yes.

17 Q. But he wasn't charged with anything at that point, because you had
18 denied the summons, correct?

19 A. Right.

20 Q. Were there any appearances by either B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED] or B [REDACTED] G [REDACTED]
21 on these cases involving T [REDACTED] subsequent to January 9, 2024?

22 A. Without looking at the record, I'm not sure.

23 Q. Well, the records are here.

24 A. Does it show that there was cases or not?

25 Q. Judge, you told me that you could tell exactly what happened on a case

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1 by looking at the case file. So I'm hoping that you can do that here.

2 A. These were -- 12/20 -- pardon me? Restate the question? You were
3 asking about a specific date.

4 Q. I just want to know, were there any appearances after January 9, 2024, of
5 the G ██████ in connection with J ██████ T ██████'s complaints?

6 A. I don't believe so. I don't think so.

7 Q. Okay. Thank you.

8 A. I believe -- I can't recall any other appearances during the course of last
9 year --

10 Q. Okay.

11 A. -- since that particular 9 January date.

12 Q. Thank you.

13 MS. KLEIN: Ms. Dean, would it be okay if we
14 took a ten-minute break at this point?

15 THE REFEREE: Yes.

16 MS. KLEIN: And then I -- and then, hopefully,
17 we can wind down a little bit, I'm hoping.

18 THE REFEREE: Yes, absolutely.

19 MS. KLEIN: Okay.

20 THE REFEREE: Go off the record at 12:06.

21 (Recess from 12:07 p.m. until 12:17 p.m.)

22 THE REFEREE: We're back on the record at
23 12:17 p.m. after a short recess.

24 Whenever you're ready.

25 MS. KLEIN: Thank you.

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1 BY MS. KLEIN:

2 Q. Judge --

3 A. I'm sorry. I have my hat on. And I should've asked you, is that okay?

4 I'm just so darn used to wearing the thing. Obviously, you would've said
5 something before now.

6 Q. It's fine, Judge.

7 A. Is it -- all right. Thank you.

8 Q. All right. Thanks for asking. It's fine. Judge, just to clarify, when the
9 Dog Warden writes an appearance ticket for Town of Columbia Court,
10 who handles those cases? Like, is there a Prosecutor? Does the dog
11 warden come in? What happens if there's a trial?

12 A. There's a -- they come in, and it's kind of like a traffic ticket. They come
13 in and provide a guilty or not guilty plea. So the way it initially is,
14 somebody's got a complaint; they call the Dog Warden. The Dog
15 Warden goes out, issues a little, handwritten piece of paper to the
16 individual about a dog that's at large or whatever. And then a copy of
17 that is provided to the Court, and the Court is given the knowledge by
18 virtue of that of the appearance date of that individual. That's the
19 process.

20 Q. All right. And if the matter goes to trial, who asks the questions?

21 A. They've never went to trial. They either pled guilty or not guilty. And if
22 it was a not guilty, they typically -- if it was a not guilty plea, they
23 would've went to the District Attorney.

24 Q. Okay.

25 A. The District Attorney would review them in the same fashion as a typical

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1 traffic ticket or anything of that nature.

2 Q. Okay.

3 A. And I've handed -- there is a fine schedule. And I've done some fines by
4 virtue of guilty plea here and there, I think, along the road. So that's the
5 way that they're handled. But they're originated by the Dog Warden.

6 Q. Okay. Thank you.

7 A. And they're originated by somebody -- the Dog Warden doesn't go out
8 running around looking for a dog running around. The Dog Warden
9 waits for somebody to call them, and then the Dog Warden goes to that
10 individual and say, "What's going on?" And the guy's -- "Well, my
11 neighbor's dog is running around over and over, here and there." And
12 that could generate, again, the paperwork that would come to the court.

13 Q. Okay. Thank you, Judge. Moving on to J█████ T█████. As part of the
14 Court's record -- response to the Commission's record request, you
15 forwarded one audio file from March 5, 2024, wherein the complainant,
16 J█████ T█████, appeared in the Town of Columbia Court. Before I get to
17 the details of that appearance, when did you first come into contact with
18 J█████ T█████ in connection with the G█████ matters, Judge?

19 A. It would've been at the town meeting, the beginning of 2024, that he
20 attended. I didn't know he was going to be there. I presented
21 independent -- he's sitting somewhere there. And I wouldn't recognize
22 him, anyway. He's sitting in the court -- or in the town board meeting. I
23 presented all of the records as required to the town of the financial
24 records, which needs to be done on a annual basis. Upon completion of
25 that, he took over. He, immediately after completion -- thank you for all

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1 of that. And then he -- and I'm not sure -- that is not recorded -- or how
2 the town board minutes were read. But he spent ten minutes --

3 Q. Who's "he"?

4 A. T█████.

5 Q. Okay. Spent ten --

6 A. He spent ten minutes, in a very loud voice, indicating the way I handle
7 cases inappropriately, that my family -- that you shouldn't be doing it
8 anymore. And I'm making just very -- summaries of what was said. But
9 then I invited him by -- and I would not get into, at a town board meeting,
10 a discussion between the Court and him at a town board meeting. I think
11 that's totally inappropriate. Let him talk. And the Town Supervisor let
12 him talk. He talked more than I would've liked. I wouldn't say that, but
13 he talked. And then at the end of that, I said, "Mr. T█████, I invite you
14 back to a court session" -- and I think you've got that part of it -- "where
15 we will give you the details of the case." And then he subsequently come
16 back then. That's when -- he was only there, and law enforcement was
17 there. But I took the initiative by virtue of those discussions -- not
18 discussions -- statements he made at the town board meeting --

19 Q. May I --

20 A. -- to invite him and say, "I understand you were not there at that
21 particular time, but I'm willing to discuss and review the outcome of the
22 case with you."

23 Q. And you said this during the town board meeting to him?

24 A. Yeah. I invited him back.

25 Q. And --

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- 1 A. Then I said, "We can discuss it further." That's the end of it.
- 2 Q. What did you give him for a date and time to come back?
- 3 A. I give him a date and time, but I'm not sure. But he came back, I think.
- 4 Q. Okay.
- 5 A. I'm sure I give him a date and time at that time.
- 6 Q. Okay. And were you face to face during that conversation?
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 Q. Okay. Was he hostile?
- 9 A. Yes. I would not -- and I would not do it without law enforcement
- 10 being --
- 11 Q. Why was he angry?
- 12 A. He just angry with what the court, and I specifically, do.
- 13 Q. Was he angry because you dismissed the G [REDACTED] case?
- 14 A. No. He's angry at my family and me.
- 15 Q. Why?
- 16 A. I don't know why. I know his background, but that's neither here nor
- 17 there.
- 18 Q. What's his background?
- 19 A. I think he's a multi-convicted felon. I believe so.
- 20 Q. For what?
- 21 A. Oh, I wouldn't know, because I don't convict any obvious felonies.
- 22 Apparently, I had him in a case in 2011, and he had to come in and make
- 23 a payment. And he was angry and said he didn't -- he had already done it.
- 24 Q. Um-hum.
- 25 A. But I don't -- we're talking 15 years ago -- 12 or 15 years ago. But

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1 subsequently, I think -- I don't know if you look at his -- you probably -- I
2 don't look at his rap sheet, because his rap sheet had nothing to do with
3 the dog case. His background is inappropriate for me to review in respect
4 to the dog. The dog case is because they were on his property. He has
5 that absolute right.

6 Q. What happened in 2011?

7 A. He came in to make a payment and said he'd already made it on some --
8 there must've been some kind of a case that he had in court. And he came
9 in and made the payment for --

10 Q. And --

11 A. -- some type of violation. And to go back and try to figure it out, I don't
12 know -- do you -- figure out exactly the case, what that was. I know he
13 did come in at that time. I knew he did make a payment on some kind of
14 an incident. I do know that.

15 Q. And did he file a complaint against you about that?

16 A. No, not then, not that I know of.

17 Q. All right. So you invited him to come in. Did there come a time where
18 Mr. T█████ appeared in your court?

19 A. Pardon me?

20 Q. Did there come a time where Mr. T█████ appeared in court?

21 A. By virtue of my invite at the town board meeting, yes.

22 Q. All right. And was that on March 5, 2024, the audio recording you
23 provided?

24 A. I presume -- he would not have come in for any other purpose. Yes. I'm
25 saying that's coincidentally works with the timing of the town board

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1 meeting and subsequently inviting him to court. What was the date,
2 March 5th?

3 Q. Yes. March 5, 2024, was the date that your court provided -- that you
4 provided audio for of Mr. T■■■■'s appearance.

5 A. Okay, okay.

6 Q. Does that comport with your recollection?

7 A. Yes, it does. That would follow up with my inviting him at the town
8 board meeting back to court. And it's a courtesy on the Court's part to
9 give him the details of the outcome of the T■■■■ case.

10 Q. How did you invite him? What did you say, specifically?

11 A. I said, rather than get into any discussions here are inappropriate. That's
12 at the town board meeting. I'm inviting you back, and the Court is
13 willing to review the outcome of the case. That's not a -- that's not a
14 particular item that's pertinent to review at a town board meeting.

15 Q. And what case were we talking about?

16 A. I think the G■■■■ case.

17 Q. Are you aware that Mr. T■■■■ thought that you were ordering him back
18 to the court?

19 A. No. I wouldn't order him back to court. I was inviting him back to court.

20 Q. Was he charged --

21 A. I was doing -- go ahead. I'm sorry.

22 Q. That's okay.

23 A. Sorry to interrupt.

24 Q. Was J■■■■ T■■■■ charged with anything at that time?

25 A. No, he was not charged. It's just an informational discussion to update

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1 him on the G █████ case.

2 Q. In the Town of Columbia Court, is there an open courtroom?

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. Are litigants --

5 A. But there --

6 Q. Go ahead.

7 A. Go ahead.

8 Q. No, I'll let you finish.

9 A. But there's -- it's an open courtroom, but there's a limited -- because of the
10 space limitations. I'm not having too many people in there. If it's a busy
11 night, the Court Clerk keeps the people in their cars. Let's say there are
12 five -- let's say I can invite five in -- five people with traffic tickets is
13 reasonable to handle because of the logistics within a courtroom. And
14 then he'll go out and invite five more people in, for example.

15 Q. How many people can fit in the courtroom, roughly?

16 A. Yeah, probably 10 or 12, realistically.

17 Q. But you limit those appearing to about five; is that right?

18 A. Yeah. I mean, you got Defense Lawyers, somebody with them. To say
19 five bodies -- I might bring in five people with tickets, and there may be
20 eight people, because there's -- they got somebody with them.

21 Q. How do the people know to come in? Who alerts the people to come
22 inside?

23 A. The Court Clerk.

24 Q. All right. So --

25 A. And the Court Clerk -- the first thing that occurs is they come in and they

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1 register with the Court Clerk. The Court Clerk writes them all down and
2 tells them to go back, and that he will come back -- let's say it's 5:30, and
3 all these people have come in at six o'clock; it's court time. And then he
4 says -- then he'll contact me and say, "We have these individuals here as
5 their traffic" -- let's call it just traffic violation -- "these are the people that
6 out there for you to see, and this is the order that they signed in." And
7 then I will tell him, usually, if the timing is correct, at six p.m., Bring in
8 the first five on your list" --

9 Q. All right.

10 A. -- so that we can effectively handle this.

11 Q. The audio you provided to the Commission indicates that Mr. T [REDACTED]
12 appeared in your court on March 5th at about 7:30 p.m. Was he, like --
13 was he the last case called?

14 A. There was no -- there was no cases that night. Yeah, there was no case.
15 It was -- I wasn't bringing him in the middle of -- let's see. That's March
16 5th. So that's a DA night.

17 Q. Um-hum.

18 A. That was after all of the DA doings with other cases so that there weren't
19 other people sitting around the courtroom, just him --

20 Q. And was that --

21 A. -- and law enforcement.

22 Q. -- was that deliberate, to call him --

23 A. Oh, yeah, it was deliberate on my part, because I was concerned about
24 interruptions similar to what he did at the town board meeting.

25 Q. All right. And what transpired during that appearance?

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1 A. I indicated to him the discussions about that case. But during that whole
2 case -- I have a distance from me to you to the defendant. And I'm a little
3 higher than him. And he insisted to be at right here. He wanted to be,
4 theoretically, in my face. I said, "No. Please stand back." Now, there's
5 law enforcement near, because I'm concerned. Obviously, I'm concerned
6 with him the -- predicated on what occurred at the town board meeting.
7 That's why I'm -- that's why I was concerned. So that's why I -- and law
8 enforcement was gracious enough to have a representative there. But
9 normally don't have anybody there, other than if they're bringing in
10 somebody from jail; then you've got the -- then you've got the appropriate
11 Deputies that are bringing them in and so forth. But no -- I normally
12 don't have law enforcement. And I'm going to make a quick statement in
13 that respect. All the courts in New York State at DA night ought to
14 have -- ought to law enforcement there --

15 Q. Okay. Thank you.

16 A. -- on DA night.

17 Q. Thank you. All right. So what did -- what transpired while he was there?

18 You discussed the --

19 A. The --

20 Q. -- G [REDACTED] matter?

21 A. -- the intent of my -- of having him there was to go over exactly the
22 outcome of the G [REDACTED] case.

23 Q. What did you tell him?

24 A. You know, I told him, in respect to the deer causing the incident, and that
25 was the reason why that they are, and he was instructed to keep his

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1 animals off of your property.

2 Q. So you told Mr. --

3 A. G [REDACTED] -- or not G [REDACTED], but --

4 Q. You told Mr. T [REDACTED] --

5 A. -- T [REDACTED] that.

6 Q. -- you told Mr. T [REDACTED] at that time that you had dismissed the G [REDACTED]

7 charge --

8 A. No. I told --

9 Q. -- charges?

10 A. -- Mr. T [REDACTED] at that time that they were to keep their animals on their
11 side of the fence. To dismiss it would mean that it was okay where they
12 were at. The term to say dismissed means that everything was okay,
13 what you did. It darn right was not okay. It was not okay for them to be
14 on that adjacent property. That's not his property. That's not the G [REDACTED]
15 property, even though it was generated by virtue of the darn dead deer on
16 the T [REDACTED] property.

17 Q. All right. I'm going to reference for the record Commission's Exhibit 1.
18 This is a transcript, which was an enclosure in the March 17th letter to the
19 Judge. And it's a transcript of the appearance of Mr. T [REDACTED] on March 5,
20 2024, before the Judge. I'm just going to read page 6 of this transcript,
21 line 12. "Judge Skinner: Right. That were dismissed. That was
22 dismissed. So again, you'll listen. You're listening, because I'm
23 conveying to you exactly what the Court did with the charges. So both of
24 them -- so they indicated to me they were going to put up some kind of
25 fence in their yard, whether that's required or not, to keep their dogs off

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1 your land. So that's the way it was left. That was" -- and then it was -- he
2 interrupted you. Is that an accurate statement? Is that what you said
3 during --

4 A. Right.

5 Q. -- that appearance?

6 A. But to say it's dismissed and tell them they have to put a fence up, they
7 don't really go together, because dismiss means they don't need to do
8 anything. But they did. They need to put a fence up, and they need to
9 keep their darn dogs off of the neighbor's property. So --

10 Q. Are you just making up this definition of dismissed? Where are you
11 getting this?

12 A. If it says -- if it's dismissed, there was not a fine associated or anything
13 like that with it. Theoretically, it wasn't dismissed. It was -- they were
14 told to keep the animals on their property in consideration of appropriate
15 protection of the animals. To say it was dismissed may be inappropriate.
16 I agree with that. To say -- dismiss means it was all right. It wasn't all
17 right.

18 Q. So what was the legal conclusion of the case?

19 A. Well, the legal -- say what you want what the legal conclusion is. The
20 deal was, keep your darn dogs on your property.

21 Q. But there was no finding of guilt or innocence, correct?

22 A. No.

23 Q. And there was no --

24 A. I guess you wouldn't -- if you want to say that's saying guilty or not --
25 apparently, if you tell them to keep the dogs, apparently, that's an

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1 insinuation that there's guilt, because the darn dogs -- I'm telling them to
2 keep it off the property that they were on.

3 Q. So you're finding them guilty, then?

4 A. I'm finding them by telling them exactly what to do. So then that -- if
5 that's a guilty plea, that's a guilty plea. Yes. But it -- and not guilty in
6 respect that there wasn't any fines issued or anything of that nature. So I
7 may have said dismissed or something or other. And that may -- and I
8 agree, that may be -- the terminology may be inappropriate. But it was
9 quite clear to the G [REDACTED] exactly what they had to do. It was quite
10 clear.

11 Q. And did you say to Mr. T [REDACTED] at that time, and according to the
12 transcript, page 5, "I was given pictures of that event by them showing
13 me what occurred and why the dogs were out. Admittedly, they were on
14 adjacent property"?

15 A. That's correct.

16 Q. All right. And in that, you're referring to the G [REDACTED] ' dogs?

17 A. Pardon me? The G [REDACTED] ' dogs.

18 Q. But it was -- but it was -- you're excusing their being -- the dogs being on
19 the property because you believe there was a deer there; is that right?

20 A. Oh, I was convinced there was a deer by with the pictures that were
21 provided.

22 Q. Which was outside the presence of Mr. T [REDACTED] or the DA, right?

23 A. Right.

24 Q. Before you dismissed that case, did you provide notice to the District
25 Attorney's Office?

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- 1 A. I don't think -- I don't know if I did or didn't.
- 2 Q. Are you aware there's a statutory requirement that a dismissal be made in
- 3 writing and on notice to the prosecution?
- 4 A. I may not have done that. I'm telling you that right now.
- 5 Q. Do you think that a Judge should be faithful to a requirement under the
- 6 statute?
- 7 A. I think that the Judge is faithful to the wellbeing and harmony within the
- 8 community.
- 9 Q. What about the law?
- 10 A. We all have to adhere to the law --
- 11 Q. Were you doing that here?
- 12 A. -- whether we like them or not. We have to adhere to the law.
- 13 Q. Did you do that here?
- 14 A. We walk a fine --
- 15 Q. Did --
- 16 A. I'm sorry. Go ahead. You're talking, and I am, and that's inappropriate.
- 17 Q. Did you do that here? Did you adhere to the law in dismissing the case?
- 18 A. Officially, it probably says I'm dismissing the case, but I -- but at the
- 19 same time, I told them they got to keep the darn -- they got to keep the
- 20 darn dogs off the property. So I am not sure that I'm dismissing the case.
- 21 Dismissing would, again, mean -- I'm repeating myself -- would, again,
- 22 clearly mean that --
- 23 Q. Was --
- 24 A. -- the dogs weren't doing anything wrong.
- 25 Q. Was there a motion --

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1 A. That's wrong. That's --

2 Q. -- was --

3 A. -- inappropriate.

4 Q. -- was there a motion to dismiss before the Court on the G [REDACTED] case, if
5 you recall?

6 A. No, not that I recall.

7 Q. All right. Did there come a time where you allowed Mr. T [REDACTED] to talk
8 during that appearance?

9 A. Mr. T [REDACTED] talked most of the time.

10 Q. All right. How would you describe your demeanor during your
11 interaction with Mr. T [REDACTED] from the bench that evening?

12 A. I am wearing a robe. My demeanor is that I give him a fair shake no
13 matter how he acts, that I don't get into any personal or any kind of
14 discussions with him. He might -- now, defendants rant and rave,
15 occasionally. That's no excuse for a Judge to act inappropriately.

16 Q. Did you suggest to Mr. T [REDACTED] that you work in harmony with your
17 neighbor to get along?

18 A. Probably did. I did with the other individuals.

19 Q. You think that's effective?

20 A. Do I think it's effective?

21 Q. Yeah.

22 A. It's clear from the Court's viewpoint of the position of the Court.

23 Whether it's effective or not in respect to Mr. T [REDACTED], you can question --
24 by his demeanor and actions within court.

25 Q. Judge, I'm going to review a couple of traffic matters with you that came

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1 to our attention in reviewing the records sent to the Commission. Do you
2 recall presiding over a matter of *People v T* [REDACTED] *N* [REDACTED]? You were
3 asked to review the court's records and audio. We also gave you a
4 transcript. Did you review that before today?

5 A. Yes. You want to go over that? I don't recall exactly what that case was,
6 but I will quickly.

7 Q. All right. Well, it appears from the records that T [REDACTED] N [REDACTED] appeared
8 in the Town of Columbia Court in December 26, 2023, with respect to a
9 speeding ticket issued by the New York State Police. He was doing 75 in
10 a 55-mile-an-hour zone. He drove from Rochester, and he appeared in
11 court -- worked for a medical company, was delivering a device needed
12 for surgery. Do you remember this gentleman?

13 A. Yes.

14 Q. All right. And he had driven to your court from Rochester. And the
15 Court offered the defendant an opportunity to speak; is that right?

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. All right. And what did he tell you at that time?

18 A. To the best of my knowledge, he was delivering some kind of equipment
19 to the hospital -- I believe it was Bassett Hospital in Cooperstown -- that
20 was needed by a patient. And as a result -- well, part of -- he was --
21 during that delivery process is when the traffic ticket was issued.

22 Q. Okay. Did you conduct your own investigation into what he was telling
23 you? Did you ask him questions about it?

24 A. I just used what he told me and what the paperwork told me.

25 Q. All right. And --

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1 A. I didn't request anything. I just say, "Do you have a plea" -- and oh, by
2 the way, then I might hear a story or something. I hear lots of stories
3 about traffic tickets. So --

4 Q. Who prosecutes the state police traffic tickets in your court?

5 A. Who prosecutes them?

6 Q. The DA, right?

7 A. The DA. That's right.

8 Q. All right. So --

9 A. What you will find out -- I mean, you're investigating -- the DA probably
10 was not involved.

11 Q. Involved in --

12 A. I have had -- I have had previous discussions and procedures in respect to
13 what typically would be offered. So in the interest of time and justice, I
14 will make decisions, very, very few decisions -- not totally independent
15 of the DA, because the DA and I have discussions in respect if it's this
16 type of case, we will do -- we will do this, that kind of a thing. And in
17 respect that, that background served as my vehicle for making judgments
18 on these cases.

19 Q. Was he under oath, T [REDACTED] N [REDACTED]?

20 A. All the people that come in are under oath.

21 Q. How -- did you swear him in at that point? It's not on the record.

22 A. Usually, I like to swear everybody in at the beginning of the thing, rather
23 than do it individually as they walk up to the Court.

24 Q. That's not recorded here. And you just told me that they wait outside. So
25 was --

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1 A. Right.

2 Q. -- this guy sworn or not?

3 A. Right. I agree that the statements may or may not officially been done
4 under oath.

5 Q. Okay.

6 A. That does not mean that they weren't accurate or correct.

7 Q. How do you know?

8 A. How do I know if they're under oath whether they're correct or not?

9 Q. No. How do you know if the statement that he's telling you is accurate or
10 correct? Because he's in a suit?

11 A. No. It's by virtue of maybe how many thousand cases I've done. I look
12 them -- and I make a judgment. Somebody's got to make a judgment. Is
13 this person telling me what really happened --

14 Q. Okay.

15 A. -- or is this person giving me a story? Well, the first thing is, I've
16 reviewed their driver's record. I'm talking generally speaking. So I
17 understand -- which I can do previous to any traffic ticket.

18 Q. And do you?

19 A. Yeah. I look -- and I usually look at their driver's record to see what kind
20 of a judgment to place on this individual. If they say -- if they say not
21 guilty, it's going to the DA. I make no recommendations. They're asking
22 me, "What should I do?" And I make a lot of recommendations that there
23 are Lawyers available for you to appropriately review this case with.

24 Q. So how did you make -- tell me again -- explain to me how you made a
25 determination that he was telling the truth. You were saying, because of

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1 thousands of cases, it allows you to --

2 A. Well --

3 Q. -- look at people?

4 A. -- that, and the firm is a firm that I'm familiar with that he worked for and
5 stuff like that, that, you know, the delivery -- in fact, the what he was
6 doing. It's hard for me to judge that he was delivering something special
7 would make that kind of a statement to court to try to get out of the ticket.

8 Q. You didn't think --

9 A. And he didn't have any other tickets -- excuse me -- by the way, I don't
10 believe.

11 Q. You didn't think it was likely that he was lying to you; is that what you're
12 saying?

13 A. That's correct.

14 Q. And specifically, what gave you that impression?

15 A. Well, his employer, his driver's record, his physical statements in front of
16 me.

17 Q. What'd you do with Mr. N█████'s ticket?

18 A. Pardon me?

19 Q. What did you do with Mr. N█████'s ticket?

20 A. They should -- when were they done? Because they -- theoretically,
21 they've got to be shown as dismissed, I believe. If they're not, the
22 paperwork hasn't been done for them. If they're still outstanding, I need
23 to go over that with the Court Clerk. And we officially indicate that that
24 particular case was dismissed.

25 Q. All right. Here, I'm looking at the *People v T█████ N█████* transcript

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- 1 provided in Exhibit 1, page 4 of that transcript, line 20. "Judge Skinner:
2 The Court's dismissing this ticket. We are dismissing it."
3 A. Okay.
4 Q. "We'll send you a notification to this when we get the ticket."
5 A. Yeah. When was the date of that, ma'am? Sorry to say ma'am, but that's
6 my Texas thing.
7 Q. That would've been December 26, 2023. Did the date have some
8 relevance in your dismissing it?
9 A. No, no, the date has no relevance. It's just a -- I was just wondering what
10 Court Clerk -- I had the --
11 Q. Well, you do say --
12 A. -- ADA at that time --
13 Q. -- you do --
14 A. -- or the --
15 Q. You do say, "Coming the day after Christmas and taking care of it, it was
16 nice of him to come," on -- that's page 6, line 20.
17 A. I believe so.
18 Q. So do you think it was nice of him to make an appearance the day after
19 Christmas? You think that's a relevant consideration for dismissing a
20 ticket?
21 A. Any appearance on the specific date, as indicated on the ticket, that is
22 made on that date is relevant. It just happened to be the day after
23 Christmas. And I might've said that. But any time they come in on the
24 date they're due, that's a plus on their part --
25 Q. How about this?

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1 A. -- because a third of them -- or half of them don't.

2 Q. How about this? Page 6 of the T ██████ N ██████ transcript, line 2, "Going
3 on the date, he's dressed very professionally. Clerk Buck: Yeah, clean
4 cut. Judge Skinner: Right."

5 A. Right. All of that was -- all of those are factors in the appearance.
6 Respect for the Court, in my opinion, is an important component of the
7 court. And coming in on the appropriate time, treating the Court as a
8 Court, and your appearance are all pluses to the Court.

9 Q. You're judging whether he's telling the truth by his appearance in this
10 case?

11 A. I'm not making any judgment on the ticket based on his appearance. I'm
12 just indicating that I'm glad that he came in on the time and he made this
13 appearance.

14 Q. Was this done *ex parte*? The Prosecutor was not present, so I'm asking
15 you, was this done *ex parte*?

16 A. Prosecutor is not present at any of the traffic tickets. He isn't there
17 when -- the Prosecutor is not there when I arraign them, and he's not
18 there -- I get them back with a written recommendation by the Prosecutor.
19 Every one of them are returned to me from the Prosecutor with a not
20 guilty plea. And there's notes within the file that say what the
21 Prosecutor's recommendation.

22 Q. But the Prosecutor never got the case of T ██████ N ██████, correct?

23 A. I'm not sure whether he did or didn't. Maybe he didn't. I may have -- I
24 may have dismissed him, but it's predicated on my familiar dealing with
25 him on an ongoing basis for many years.

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1 Q. Dealing with who?

2 A. The Prosecutor.

3 Q. And which one is that?

4 A. The one that's been there for years and years.

5 Q. You don't remember his -- is it Eisencliff [sic], Eisenhut?

6 A. I think it's Cliff Eisenhut. Maybe it -- I'm not sure his first name, but it's
7 Eisenhut. It's definitely Eisenhut.

8 Q. Did you ever speak to the Trooper on this case?

9 A. Pardon me?

10 Q. Did you ever speak to the Trooper on the M [REDACTED] matter?

11 A. No.

12 Q. Do you have a legal basis aside from how he represented himself in
13 court? What is your legal basis for dismissing the ticket? Do you
14 understand that you can't do this, Judge? Do you understand that?

15 A. The outcome -- if they plead guilty, I adjudicate them appropriately. Am
16 I making judgments based on a very limited basis of thousands of them,
17 very, very, very limited basis that I've dismissed them? Yes, I have. You
18 will find them there. I'll grant you that you will find them there. If that's
19 a judgment you want to make, maybe you ought to look at all the cases
20 that I do, because I do a lot of cases. But anyway --

21 Q. What's your legal --

22 A. -- on a very limited -- most -- I mean, 99.9 percent are reviewed by the
23 DA. Probably, in traffic, I get 30 or 40 percent pleas by mail. And
24 generally speaking, they're not guilty pleas. So they go immediately to
25 the -- the DA, when he comes in, he's given that file with the official

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- 1 written plea by the traffic violator.
- 2 Q. Judge, New York Criminal Procedure Law, section 170.45 and 210.45
- 3 require dismissals on such things to be on notice to the Prosecution. You
- 4 dismiss --
- 5 A. Okay.
- 6 Q. Okay? So now --
- 7 A. All righty.
- 8 Q. -- all right -- hold on. You dismissed this case for T ██████ N ██████ on
- 9 December 26, 2023, and did not notify the Prosecution.
- 10 A. At that --
- 11 Q. You --
- 12 A. -- time, you're right.
- 13 Q. Okay.
- 14 A. You're absolutely right.
- 15 Q. Listen.
- 16 A. I agree.
- 17 Q. Are you in violation of the statute?
- 18 A. Apparently, I am, yes.
- 19 Q. Is this news to you?
- 20 A. It's a violation of the statute.
- 21 Q. Yeah, the law, you know, what you're presiding over.
- 22 A. Right. We're talking about one out of a thousand or something. But
- 23 that's the most important ones, apparently. I agree.
- 24 Q. Most important what?
- 25 A. I agree that I dismissed them independent of the Prosecutor noting about

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1 that specific case. Is it done independent of ongoing reviews with the
2 Prosecutor as to what their process and procedures are? No. I
3 communicate a lot with the Prosecutor. Is it done from an efficiency
4 standpoint to limit the amount appearances and the requirement? Yes. Is
5 it inappropriate? You can easily make that judgment, yes.

6 Q. It's in violation of the law, Judge.

7 A. Okay. Thank you.

8 Q. Do you understand?

9 A. All right. Thank you.

10 Q. Do you understand, though? All right. I'll move on.

11 A. What the -- I mean, does the law say that a Judge has no ability to
12 dismiss? I'm not sure you're indicating a violation of the law. I agree
13 with this fully. Theoretically, every case that I get a not guilty plea, every
14 case, should go to the District Attorney for a review and a
15 recommendation come back. Now, if that's done, suppose the Judge don't
16 agree with the DA's approach. What's the outcome?

17 Q. You tell me, Judge. It's your court.

18 A. I'm the Judge. I have the final say. But --

19 Q. All right.

20 A. -- that just doesn't happen. That just doesn't happen. I mean, in respect
21 to cases, they're handled almost entirely as recommended. Nowadays, a
22 typical traffic ticket is a 1214 or an open door. That's the typical process
23 that the District Attorney will recommend. I will review that case. I will
24 make sure that the defendant is fully aware of what has been offered to
25 that individual by the District Attorney.

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1 Q. All right. I'm going to --

2 A. I want to make them aware of that, that --

3 Q. I'm going to move on, Judge.

4 A. Go ahead. Go for it.

5 Q. On January 30, 2024, you presided over the matter of *People v B* [REDACTED]
6 *M* [REDACTED]. That's M, as in Mary, [REDACTED]. We've given you the transcript
7 for this. Defendant was charged with moving from lane unsafely. And
8 you presided over the matter. He told you about injuries sustained in
9 crashing his vehicle in an accident that yielded the ticket. Do you
10 remember that case?

11 A. I think so. What was the outcome of it?

12 Q. Well, the outcome of the case is after you discussed his 12-day stay in the
13 hospital over Christmas and not being able to speak with the Trooper,
14 you *sua sponte* dismissed the moving from lane unsafely.

15 A. Okay.

16 Q. Do you see any issue with that?

17 A. The issue is just exactly what you said. Theoretically, I guess it's got to
18 go to the DA if it's -- what happens if nothing occurs on the ticket -- that
19 is, if they don't plead guilty or not guilty? What can the Court do then?

20 Q. Let me ask you this, Judge. Why did you dismiss his ticket?

21 A. Which --

22 Q. Mr. M [REDACTED]. Do you remember the case?

23 A. Is that the one where there were -- yeah, that's the one where there was
24 accidents involved --

25 Q. Yes.

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1 A. -- an accident involved?

2 Q. Yes. There is an accident involved. Would you like to review the
3 transcript for a moment?

4 A. I'll take a quick look at. Thank you for letting me.

5 Q. I just want to know what you used to determine that you should dismiss
6 that charge.

7 A. He was on his way to a job at the state hospital emergency on his way to
8 work at -- or in the morning. Right. I did.

9 Q. All right. How did you come up with that dismissal? What did you --
10 what did you consider?

11 A. Based on his existing driver's records and what his actions were at that
12 time, at that time of night.

13 Q. Okay. Did you take into consideration his injuries?

14 A. That is his consideration (unintelligible) got through -- all of the
15 discussion was part of the dismissal.

16 Q. Do you see any danger, Judge, in asking defendants questions when -- did
17 this guy have an Attorney present?

18 A. No, he didn't have an Attorney.

19 Q. Do you see any issue with asking defendants questions about the facts of
20 their case without the Prosecution present and without an Attorney
21 present? Do you see any problem with that?

22 A. There probably is, and you will find these cases. But I'd suggest you look
23 at another thousand or so and see -- that are handled. There are a limited
24 a few I have done that with, and those are the ones that you are looking
25 at, that I personally, as the Judge, dismissed predicated on the facts

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1 offered by the individual and predicated on the event.

2 Q. Was this guy sworn?

3 A. Pardon me?

4 Q. Was this defendant sworn?

5 A. They're all officially sworn, but to say if he wasn't sworn, that means he
6 could've made a statement that was incorrect versus if he was sworn, then
7 the statement would've been different.

8 Q. Well, he's not sworn on the record, right?

9 A. Correct. So officially, it's -- I guess, because he was not officially sworn,
10 the statement that he made could be interpreted as other than being
11 accurate; is that correct -- if he wasn't sworn in? Does a sworn-in mean
12 that he's going to make a real, accurate statement versus not sworn in,
13 making another kind of a statement? I presume, in all cases, if he's
14 looking at me as the Judge, that he's making an accurate statement.
15 That's what I predicate that on.

16 Q. What if the defendant makes an admission of guilt without --

17 A. If he makes an admission of guilt, I have a plea, then, a plea of --
18 whatever the plea is.

19 Q. Okay. Hypothetically speaking, if there's no District Attorney present,
20 there's no Attorney present, but the driver who received the V & T
21 infraction is in front of you, starts answering your questions about the
22 incident involving the ticket -- what if they admit guilt to it?

23 A. Then they're guilty.

24 Q. And then what do you do? You take a plea?

25 A. Pardon me?

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1 Q. Then what do you do next? You take a plea?

2 A. Well, I think, when you say that, you're saying that they pled guilty.

3 Q. No. I'm saying --

4 A. If there's the admission of guilt, and there's a -- and a plea of guilty are
5 two different things?

6 Q. What if -- well, let's go on to the next case --

7 A. Okay.

8 Q. -- *People v D█████ K█████*. Also appeared on January 30, 2024, in Town of
9 Columbia Court in connection with a cell phone violation. She appeared
10 with an unidentified translator, because she was Ukrainian. And you
11 began asking her questions about the circumstances of her cell phone use.

12 A. Through the interpreter, I think.

13 Q. Correct. Ms. K█████ admitted that she was on the cell phone, noted that
14 she was speaking with her Doctor.

15 A. Okay.

16 Q. Do you remember having a discussion with her about that?

17 A. I'm trying to -- and see what the discussion was between the interpreter
18 and her and then back to me. I don't know if doing an interpreter is a
19 correct procedure without having an official interpreter. That's just a
20 question in respect to interpreter's situation. That's just a side question.
21 If somebody comes in and says they want -- I can't talk to you, but this
22 person knows -- can tell you -- we can talk, and he can tell me, whoever
23 he or she is. I think, theoretically, I need a -- I need a official interpreter,
24 I think. I need to, theoretically, dismiss that case -- or not dismiss it, but
25 put it aside until an interpreter is there on your behalf.

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1 Q. So why --

2 A. But I --

3 Q. -- didn't you do that?

4 A. -- do believe -- I do believe we have had incidences where they brought
5 in somebody that could clearly talk to them and talk to me.

6 Q. So why didn't you put it over for an interpreter in that case?

7 A. In the matter of efficiency, it appeared that their communication was
8 pretty accurate between the two of them and what was conveyed to me.
9 This individual was clearly able to interpret her language -- or his
10 language.

11 Q. But he said, "I don't speak Ukrainian." He spoke Russian, right? So is
12 that reliable?

13 A. Apparently, their discussions with each other were reliable, was adequate
14 that they could communicate appropriately, whether it was Ukrainian or
15 Russian that they were talking.

16 Q. In your discussion with Ms. K█████, you stated, according to page 2 of
17 the transcript, "The Court understands that this occurred on the 15th of
18 December, ten a.m. The Court understands that you were on the phone
19 with your Doctor. Were you discussing," interrupted, "Yeah. The Doctor
20 was attempting to call her from," and you said, "Okay. What hospital
21 was the Doctor from?" Why is that relevant?

22 A. I want to confirm that he [sic] was really talking to a Doctor.

23 Q. Why are you eliciting facts from a defendant who doesn't have an
24 Attorney present, when the DA is not present?

25 A. I just want to confirm the discussion was with a Doctor.

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1 Q. Do you see any issue with asking her these questions and engaging in
2 such colloquy?

3 A. Asking her a question in respect to about the Doctor or where the Doctor
4 was from or something?

5 Q. Yes.

6 A. If we -- a discussion just to clarify that she was talking to a particular
7 Doctor. That was the intent of that discussion.

8 Q. The unidentified male, on page 4 of the transcript, said, "She was using
9 the phone, so," period. "Judge Skinner: Pardon me?" "Unidentified
10 male: She was using the phone." "Judge Skinner: Okay, okay. All
11 right." And ultimately, Ms. K [REDACTED] enters a plea of guilty to cell phone
12 use; is that right?

13 A. I believe so.

14 Q. Were you conducting your own inquiry into this matter when you're --

15 A. No. I'm clarifying exactly the event.

16 Q. Okay. But that's the facts of the stop, right?

17 A. If there's facts writing on a -- written on a piece of paper that I have
18 presented in front of me, I'm going to clarify those facts.

19 Q. You're deciding what the facts of the case are --

20 A. No. I'm reading --

21 Q. -- without taking -- ah, ah (phonetic) -- without --

22 A. -- I'm reading --

23 Q. -- taking evidence.

24 A. I'm only using exactly what's written in front of me.

25 Q. If it's written on a traffic ticket, does that make it a fact?

1 A. If it's written on an official traffic ticket, it's written by probably law
2 enforcement. That makes it a fact. Who else would write -- what else
3 would they write on a traffic ticket?

4 Q. Don't facts have to be proven in a court of law?

5 A. On a (unintelligible) traffic ticket as to what exactly occurred, I use what
6 is written on the document in front of me in making that judgment,
7 because that's what the Court has been provided to review.

8 Q. All right. I'm going to move on from the traffic matters, Judge.

9 A. Thank you.

10 Q. Thank you. Judge, there is another complaint that's come to the attention
11 of our office that you failed to file reports or remit funds to the Office of
12 the State Comptroller in the time required by law for the months of April
13 through September of 2024 and that your salary was stopped as a result.
14 Is that the case?

15 A. I never stopped -- I never got my -- well, what occurred in April is I got a
16 call from the state, said, "We can't accept what I've been doing for 17
17 years and your matter of how to handle these." And that never really got
18 fully clarified exactly how to handle them. In respect to the monies being
19 deposited appropriately, indicated appropriately on reports, that was
20 done. Ultimately, that got totally reconciled by the end of 2024. 2024
21 was a transitional year in our court because the changing of the type of
22 system, the not having a Court Clerk at a particular time during that. So
23 at this point, starting on 1/1/25 until now, with the new system and a new
24 Court Clerk, things are in a heck of a lot better order, I agree, than they
25 were in 2024.

1 Q. But did you --

2 A. Are you going to find issues in '24? You are definitely going to find
3 issues in 2024. Are you going to find money issues in respect to
4 collecting fines appropriately, putting them a bank in a timely fashion,
5 ultimately reporting them to state? You're not going to find any problem
6 with that. That was done. And in respect to that, too, from 1/1/2024 to
7 the end of October 2024, that were the ten active months. In November
8 and December, there were no activity. And I was in constant contact with
9 the Comptroller's Office about the situation with no Court Clerk. In any
10 case, in retrospect to previous years, the November and December time
11 frames in the operation of the court are slow anyway. There isn't that
12 many cases that we handle in that time frame. During the course of
13 November and December 2024, I had a long case. Nothing in December,
14 one in November that ultimately was cleared in the system in January,
15 which would've been in December in a normal basis, whether --

16 Q. I'm asking you about April through September 2024, though. That's
17 when the failure to report occurred.

18 A. Oh, every one of -- every one of those months was -- that's another issue.
19 That's the issue with the state totally changing the methodology that I had
20 in place. Said, "Why can't we do this coincidental with changing the
21 court system," which would've been done by the end of 2024. No. And
22 so we continued to do everything appropriately in respect to collecting
23 the fines, document them, depositing the fines, handling the case work
24 appropriately. In respect to that time frame, to get through the end of
25 2024, I agree, there were issues to do -- and besides that, we changed the

1 system during that time frame. Not only did the state change the
2 methodology in the March-April time frame; the system changed in the
3 November time frame. In any case, the Court -- I spent an inordinate -- a
4 lot of amount of time dealing with the state in respect to making sure all
5 of the monies were handled appropriately and we were doing everything
6 correctly, knowing that we were converting the darn whole system over
7 at the end of 2024. Was it somewhat of a difficult year? It was, but the
8 monies were always handled appropriately. Did the state get their money
9 in appropriate fashion? I can't say that they did. I will say that they --
10 that the fines were appropriately handled. I'm not sure. I'd have to
11 rereview that, because now it's -- everything is kind of automatic with the
12 new system.

13 Q. All right. Thank you, Judge. Judge, just before we conclude, are you
14 familiar with the Rules Governing Judicial Conduct? You know that
15 they're out there?

16 A. Yeah, somewhat, yes.

17 Q. Rule 100.3 sub (B) sub (1) of the Rules Governing Judicial Conduct
18 states that you have a judicial obligation to be faithful to the law and
19 maintain professional competence in it, right? Do you understand that?

20 A. Yes, and I do.

21 Q. All right. And that means -- the law means statutes as well, right, Judge?

22 A. Right. And you're going to tell me I don't, but that's okay. I understand.
23 And I admit that, during that transitional period -- and I'm going to bring
24 up another situation --

25 Q. But wait --

(Hon. John M. Skinner)

1 A. -- in 2024.

2 Q. -- before you do that, Judge. Rules Governing Judicial Conduct section
3 100.3 sub (B) sub (6), you have to accord every person who has a legal
4 interest in a proceeding the right to be heard according to law. And
5 you -- it's either that person or that person's Lawyer must be heard. And a
6 Judge shall not initiate, permit, or consider *ex parte* communications or
7 consider other communications made to the Judge outside the presence of
8 the parties or their Lawyers concerning proceeding. Do you think --

9 A. Right. I understand that.

10 Q. Did you follow that rule during the G █████ matter?

11 A. I believe so.

12 Q. Do you think that you gave the complainant an opportunity to be heard in
13 that case before --

14 A. I gave --

15 Q. -- dismissing it?

16 A. -- I gave the complainant plenty of opportunity to be heard, and he was
17 heard whether you wanted to or not at the town board meeting. Then he
18 was given another opportunity by me, the Judge, to come in and go over
19 the finite details of the G █████ case with him. That was independent and
20 a result of what he did at the town board meeting.

21 Q. And Judge, you testified at the outset that you were going to check that --
22 if there were recordings of G █████ appearances in connection with these
23 complaints --

24 A. Yeah.

25 Q. -- this complaint.

1 A. I need to recheck that. I'm not sure around that time frame exactly what
2 occurred. I will -- that's another issue, and I want to bring that up, too.

3 Q. So we're -- the Commission's going to ask you to go back and look for
4 these recordings and either turn them over or advise us as to whether or
5 not they exist, all right?

6 A. Okay. Yeah. That hasn't officially been done, or has it be done?

7 Q. Why don't you know the answer to that? I mean, we asked you for the
8 records, and you haven't given it to us, right?

9 A. All right. If it's been done, we've given what we had at the time. Yes.

10 Q. You did supply one audio file, and that was for March 5, 2024 --

11 A. Okay.

12 Q. -- all right, in connection with the G █████ case. If there's any others out
13 there, we'd like you to turn them over.

14 A. Yeah. I'm not -- I will double-check, but I don't --

15 Q. Okay.

16 A. -- I don't think so, but I'll check. Thank you.

17 Q. And why wasn't it recorded, then?

18 A. I'm not sure there was any out there to record. I'm going to verify that.

19 Q. Okay.

20 A. I don't think there was any -- you're talking about since the March date --

21 Q. No.

22 A. -- until now or previous --

23 Q. No. I'm talking about --

24 A. The whole situation?

25 Q. -- the dismissal.

1 A. Yeah. Okay. Thank you.

2 Q. That should've been recorded, right?

3 A. I believe so, yes.

4 Q. Well, you believe so, or you know that you should've recorded that?

5 A. Well, in order for me to do -- to say, I'd have to check the recorder.

6 Q. No. I'm asking you, if you dismiss a case, should that be recorded in
7 front of the litigants in such (unintelligible)?

8 A. Oh, yes.

9 Q. So that should've been recorded, correct?

10 A. Right. If I dismiss a case, it should be recorded; that's correct.

11 Q. So should you have recorded the G [REDACTED] matter?

12 A. I believe so, yes.

13 Q. Why don't you know?

14 A. Because I got a lot of cases.

15 MS. KLEIN: All right. I have nothing further.

16 THE REFEREE: Judge, do you wish to make
17 any closing statement before we go off the record today?

18 JUDGE SKINNER: Pardon me, ma'am?

19 THE REFEREE: Do you wish, Judge, to make
20 any closing statement before we go off the record today?

21 JUDGE SKINNER: During the course of 2024,
22 it was more of a turbulent year than we would've known.
23 There was a incident in town where the DEC had a major
24 presence by virtue of an existing deer herd. And the -- it's a
25 red deer herd. And they ended up demolishing the herd.

1 But they also made a decision to kill several white-tail deer.
2 And they did a lot of this at night in the Town of Columbia
3 without telling anybody -- you know, telling me or anything
4 they were going to do this.

5 So the outcome was this. I get calls all over the
6 place from the residents and say, "What's going on? Judge,
7 I got lights here," or something or other. And you know,
8 they're asking the Court what's happening as a result of
9 activities of this nature, which are kind of odd and unique.
10 And it resulted in a concern for their individual safety, as
11 well as me. Now, they -- the DEC never contact me and
12 says, "You know, maybe the court -- maybe the town
13 officials ought to know what we're doing if we're going to
14 come in here and do this." They never did that. They just
15 did -- but the outcome was that the Judge got many, many
16 calls as a result of that.

17 So I'm handling this to try to keep up the
18 harmony and wellbeing of the residents in town. That's a
19 definition of what a Judge is. That's part of a Judge -- the
20 residents of a town assume that, you know -- let's call the
21 Judge and -- why is this happening, or something or other.
22 And do we get officially notified? The incident could
23 require and result in a notification, or it may not result in a
24 notification. So we try to keep that peace and harmony
25 within the court.

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And one other thing. The most important thing here is a number. The number is 591. That is the number of votes I got in November of 2024, running for the town justice. The opponent got, like, 30 or 40 votes. It's an indication, to me, in respect of the -- of what the Court has done in representing the town people themselves. It's a reflection of what has occurred in that town.

And that -- and I take a lot of pride in the fact that my name's on the ballot. The ballot's real simple. The ballot's a long line in November. On the left is one individual that's running for a big office. And far on the right, same line, is another individual, and that's me. And the guy on the left got 597 votes, and the guy on the right got 591 votes, albeit running for different positions. So the people had to go all the way across the ballot and fill in specifically that circle to vote for the justice, as they did with all the other individuals in between. They did. So I take a lot of pride in, that people took the time, even though I really didn't have that much competition, to go way over on the ballot and -- because they know I will talk to them if there is an issue in town in respect to operating the --

And the stuff you brought up, you're absolutely right in some of the ways I've handled those cases. I agree. I agree fully. Is the outcome inappropriate? I don't think so. But I agree. But if you look at 100 percent of the cases,

1 you're going to find that 99.9 percent of them are handled
2 appropriate. In respect to the T█████ case, that's a unique
3 individual situation that generated this to start with. And I
4 appreciate that. And I respect his position, even though I
5 don't like it. I mean, I don't need to like him. I need to
6 respect and honor his position as the Judge. And I do -- and
7 I do that, entirely. I do that.

8 THE REFEREE: Does that complete your
9 closing statement, sir?

10 JUDGE SKINNER: Thank you, thank you.

11 THE REFEREE: Do you have any further
12 questions, Counsel?

13 MS. KLEIN: I don't. I just wanted to note that
14 the Judge will be receiving a transcript of this proceeding
15 and that he will have seven days from receipt of that
16 transcript to provide any follow-up information that you'd
17 like the --

18 JUDGE SKINNER: Sure.

19 MS. KLEIN: -- Commission to know or any
20 response. But we'd also ask that you follow up and advise
21 us at that time as to whether you've located any additional
22 recordings for --

23 JUDGE SKINNER: Yeah. I can -- I will do
24 that.

25 MS. KLEIN: -- the G█████ matter.

1 JUDGE SKINNER: Yeah. And I admit -- it
2 was a turbulent time in the year 2024 --

3 MS. KLEIN: I understand.

4 JUDGE SKINNER: -- from a lot of
5 perspectives. And I think that -- I think the outcome and
6 the activity of a lot of people, that it's entirely, amazingly
7 positive with a new Court Clerk that's doing a heck of a
8 nice job in respect to making sure the Court Judge is
9 informed of exactly the cases and the situation, the
10 collection of the -- that individual, I've trained that
11 individual on the collection of the fines.

12 And you will find -- and the Town Supervisor
13 was on me about, "You got 48 hours." Let me tell you what
14 he meant. He meant, you got 48 hours from the time that
15 you collect on Tuesday night to the time you got to deposit
16 it. And I said, "That's not correct." And this is really -- 90
17 percent -- if you look at 17 years of deposits, probably 75
18 percent of them are done after court, let's say at nine o'clock
19 on Tuesday night. I take them to town, and I physically
20 deposit them in the night deposit. I get credit for them next
21 day. But I physically deposit it within an hour. To me,
22 that's not an issue.

23 I do not have any money in court. I will not
24 have money in court. I will handle it promptly, and it will
25 be deposited appropriately. The state will be notified

1 appropriately. Now, there's some misgiving because of the
2 changes occurred in '24; I agree that fully. But at this
3 point -- and the final numbers -- and they closed out the
4 books for 2024, and they were exactly the numbers that we
5 have submitted.

6 Now they're doing an audit. Besides, I -- you
7 know, the state's doing an audit. And so the town board are
8 going to wait until they approve the numbers. They will
9 not make any approvals until the audit is done. So they're
10 sitting on their hands, rather than accepting the outcome, as
11 the State Comptroller has indicated, until a subsequent --
12 and the audit could be for a lot of things. I mean, they
13 may -- they should -- if I were them, I'd address this deal,
14 that April through December or April through September
15 and submitting to the state -- if I was them, I'd be after me,
16 you know, "What's the situation there?"

17 So all of this is transpiring in a difficult year.
18 But when I woke up on 1/1/25, everything was absolute
19 order. To get there from here, it took some issues with a
20 new -- with the existing Court Clerk, a new Court Clerk,
21 not having a Court Clerk by part of the time. A major issue
22 was the deer herd that I was contacted many, many times
23 about. So again, I'm saying it was a -- it was a turbulent
24 year. Thank you.

25 MS. KLEIN: Thank you, Judge.

(Hon. John M. Skinner)

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THE REFEREE: We're all set. We're going to go off the record. That will conclude today's proceedings. It's 1:30 p.m. Thank you.
(Proceedings concluded at 1:30 p.m.)

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

Pursuant to Article 2-A of the Judiciary Law, the Commission on Judicial Conduct is investigating two complaints alleging that: (1) you dismissed dog-at-large and trespass charges against two defendants based on misleading, *ex parte* information, and then directed the complainant to appear in court without jurisdiction to do so; and (2) you failed to file reports or remit funds to the Office of the State Comptroller in the time required by law for the months of April through September 2024, and your salary was stopped as a result. Enclosed are copies of the complaints.

In connection with these investigations, the Commission requires that you appear to give testimony on **April 10, 2025, at 11:00 AM**, at the Commission's office in Albany at Corning Tower, Suite 2301, Empire State Plaza, Albany, New York. Directions are enclosed.

Also enclosed are transcripts for proceedings held in your court on December 26, 2023, January 30, 2024, and March 5, 2024. Prior to your appearance, please review these transcripts as well as the court's files for the matters of *People v B. G.*, *People v B. G.*, *People v T. N.*, *People v B. M.*, and *People v D. Governing Judicial Conduct, the Commission's Operating Procedures and Rules, the Commission's Policy Manual and other documents are available on the Commission's website.¹

Your appearance is required in accordance with Section 44, subdivision 3, of the Judiciary Law. This is not a hearing as provided by Section 44, subdivision 4, of the Judiciary Law. Your testimony will be sworn and recorded, and a copy of the transcription thereof will be provided to you at no cost. You have the right to be represented by counsel and to present material relevant to the complaints.

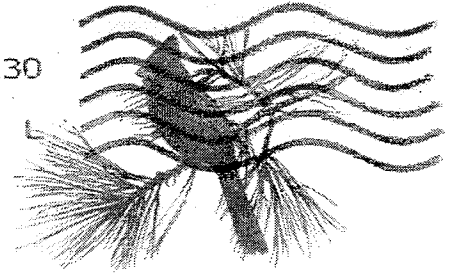

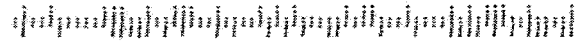

The respondent, John M. Skinner, a Justice of the Columbia Town Court,
Herkimer County, was served with a Formal Written Complaint dated February 14, 2018,
containing two charges. The Formal Written Complaint alleged that respondent delayed



and mishandled a small claims action and failed to mechanically record any court proceedings for more than eight years. Respondent filed an Answer dated April 10, 2018.

On June 6, 2018, the Administrator and respondent entered into an Agreed Statement of Facts pursuant to Section 44, subdivision 5, of the Judiciary Law, stipulating that the Commission make its determination based upon the agreed facts, recommending that respondent be censured and waiving further submissions and oral argument.

On June 13, 2018, the Commission accepted the Agreed Statement and made the following determination:

1. Respondent has been a Justice of the Columbia Town Court, Herkimer County, since 2009. His current term expires on December 31, 2020. Respondent is not an attorney.

As to Charge I of the Formal Written Complaint:

2. As set forth below, from May 2015 to November 2016, while presiding over *Erek Treen-Goff v Heidi Schimmelpfennig*, a small claims proceeding, respondent failed to be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it and failed to dispose of the matter promptly, efficiently and fairly, in that he: (A) unduly delayed holding a hearing and failed to decide the defendant's request for a jury trial until after he rendered judgment; (B) failed to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court pursuant to Section 1704 of the Uniform Justice Court Act; and (C) failed to mechanically record any appearances in the

matter, in violation of Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.

3. On April 14, 2015, Erek Treen-Goff filed a notice of small claim in the Columbia Town Court against Heidi Schimmelfennig. Mr. Treen-Goff sought \$3,000 plus \$15 court costs for damage caused to his vehicle, which he claimed was sustained when he swerved into a utility pole to avoid hitting Ms. Schimmelfennig's dog that had run into the road.

4. On April 14, 2015, Janet Elliott, the Town of Columbia court clerk, processed Mr. Treen-Goff's petition and set a hearing date for 6:00 PM on May 19, 2015.

5. On May 12, 2015, Ms. Schimmelfennig filed an "affidavit of facts" in the Columbia Town Court, demanded a jury trial and paid a jury fee in the amount of \$10 and a \$50 deposit. The affidavit was not notarized.

6. On May 19, 2015, respondent sent Ms. Schimmelfennig a letter requesting a notarized written demand for a jury trial and an affidavit of facts, among other items.

7. On June 1, 2015, Ms. Schimmelfennig re-filed a jury trial demand and "affidavit of facts." Neither the jury trial demand nor the affidavit was notarized.

8. From May 12, 2015, to August 20, 2016, respondent adjourned the hearing date at least three times, notwithstanding that neither Mr. Treen-Goff nor Ms. Schimmelfennig ever requested an adjournment.

9. Respondent failed to hold a hearing in the case until September 27, 2016. Present in the courtroom on that date were the plaintiff, the defendant, the

plaintiff's grandfather, Fred Treen, and the defendant's friend, Bob Meyer, who was an observer and did not intend to offer any testimony.

10. During the proceeding on September 27, 2016, the parties testified about the accident, and the plaintiff or his grandfather provided a police report and documentary evidence concerning repairs to Mr. Treen-Goff's vehicle.

11. At the conclusion of the proceeding on September 27, 2016, respondent adjourned the matter to provide the plaintiff with time to obtain records from the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation (NYSEG) specifying when the accident occurred and when the utility pole was replaced.

12. On October 11, 2016, the parties again appeared before respondent. Also present in the courtroom were the plaintiff's grandfather, Mr. Treen, and the defendant's son, Evan Schimmelfennig.

13. During the appearance, Mr. Treen provided respondent with weather reports from the date of the accident, handwritten statements from neighbors who had allegedly witnessed the defendant's dogs in the road, and a document from the utility company regarding repairs to the utility pole.

14. On October 11, 2016, respondent issued a judgment in favor of Mr. Treen-Goff, awarding him \$1,000 plus \$15 court costs.

15. On October 18, 2016, respondent sent Ms. Schimmelfennig a copy of the judgment. In a cover letter accompanying the judgment, respondent wrote that Ms. Schimmelfennig's motion for a jury trial was denied and he returned her \$50 deposit and \$10 filing fee.

16. On October 31, 2016, Ms. Schimmelfennig sent a Notice of Appeal to Mr. Treen-Goff and the Columbia Town Court by certified mail, signature required. The caption in the Notice of Appeal stated that the judgment was being appealed to the “Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Judicial Department,” although the Columbia Town Court is located in the Third Judicial Department and the proper forum for appeal of a town court decision is County Court.

17. On November 9, 2016, Ms. Schimmelfennig sent the Columbia Town Court a money order in the amount of \$101.50 and a \$5 cash filing fee. On November 29, 2016, respondent returned Ms. Schimmelfennig’s money order. He failed to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court, and he did not otherwise take any action on Ms. Schimmelfennig’s appeal.

18. During the pendency of *Treen-Goff v Schimmelfennig*, respondent failed to mechanically record any appearances in the case.

As to Charge II of the Formal Written Complaint:

19. From January 1, 2009, when he assumed judicial office, through May 23, 2017, respondent failed to mechanically record any appearances in the Columbia Town Court as required by Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.

20. Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge and Administrative Order 245/08 provide that every town and village justice must mechanically record all

proceedings in the court. The recording requirement became effective on June 16, 2008.

21. Respondent did not begin recording proceedings until after he was asked by the Commission during its investigation of the matters herein to provide audio recordings of appearances in *Treen-Goff v Schimmelpfennig*.

Additional Factors

22. Respondent acknowledges that he improperly delayed in holding a hearing in *Treen-Goff v Schimmelpfennig*. Prior to presiding over the matter, respondent had never received a small claims jury trial demand and did not know how to process the petition. Respondent avers that in the future he will immediately contact the Judicial Resource Center for assistance if he encounters a judicial issue that he cannot independently resolve.

23. Respondent also acknowledges that he did not mechanically record proceedings in his court prior to May 23, 2017. Respondent asserts that he did not know how to operate the laptop recorder, and until the Commission's inquiry he did not seek assistance in learning how to operate the recorder. Respondent also asserts that, notwithstanding the clear mandate of Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge and Administrative Order 245/08 that all proceedings be mechanically recorded, he believed his handwritten notes of proceedings were sufficient, even though he had not researched the matter and could point to no authority supporting his interpretation. After the Commission attempted to obtain audio recordings of proceedings in *Treen-Goff v Schimmelpfennig*, respondent received training from a local computer technician, which he acknowledges he could have done years before. Since May 2017, respondent has

complied with the mechanical recording requirement and pledges to continue to comply henceforth.

24. Respondent further acknowledges that it was improper to fail to take action on the defendant's appeal. Respondent states that he was awaiting the results of the Commission's investigation before acting on the appeal, but he now appreciates that it was inappropriate and unfair to the litigants to defer his judicial responsibilities in their case for so long, pending resolution of a disciplinary complaint against him. Respondent further states that he had never previously handled an appeal, but he assures the Commission that in the future he will consult with the Judicial Resource Center in a timely manner concerning his judicial obligations with regard to appeal procedures or any other matters that, as here, may confound him.

Upon the foregoing findings of fact, the Commission concludes as a matter of law that respondent violated Sections 100.1, 100.2(A), 100.3(B)(1), 100.3(B)(7) and 100.3(C)(1) of the Rules Governing Judicial Conduct ("Rules") and should be disciplined for cause, pursuant to Article 6, Section 22, subdivision (a), of the Constitution and Section 44, subdivision 1, of the Judiciary Law. Charges I and II of the Formal Written Complaint are sustained, and respondent's misconduct is established.

The record establishes that respondent inexcusably neglected his duties as a judge by failing to mechanically record any court proceedings for more than eight years, contrary to a statewide administrative order, and by unduly delaying a small claims matter in which he failed to hold a hearing until 17 months after a notice of claim was

filed. Respondent has acknowledged his responsibility for these ethical lapses.

Since 2008, town and village justices have been required to mechanically record all court proceedings pursuant to Administrative Order 245/08, issued pursuant to the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1). Despite this clear mandate, which went into effect shortly before he became a judge, respondent failed to record any proceedings in his court from the time he first took office and continuing for more than eight years. Respondent's claim that he "believed that his handwritten notes of proceedings were sufficient" suggests that he had at least some awareness of the recording requirement, and while he has explained that he "did not know how to operate the laptop recorder," which the court system had provided, his failure for more than eight years to seek assistance in learning to do so is plainly inexcusable. Not until after the Commission contacted him to ask for an audio recording of a particular proceeding did he seek training from a local computer technician and begin to comply with this important mandate.

The absence of a recording in any proceeding is significant since it not only makes it more difficult to determine what transpired at the proceeding but also indicates lack of compliance with an administrative order, which is inconsistent with a judge's ethical responsibilities (Rules, §100.3[C][1]). *See, e.g., Matter of Ridsdale*, 2012 NYSCJC Annual Report 148; *Matter of Allen*, 2012 NYSCJC Annual Report 64. While the cases that have come to the Commission's attention in this regard have generally involved judges who may have forgotten to turn on the recorder in isolated instances, did not ensure that the court staff had activated it or simply did not realize the equipment was not working, respondent's decision to simply ignore this important requirement by failing

to record any proceedings whatsoever was unprecedented and grossly improper.

Respondent was also responsible for significant delay in a small claims action that was filed in his court. By not holding a hearing until 17 months after the notice of claim was filed, he deprived the parties of the opportunity to have the claim resolved in a timely manner. *See Matter of Scolton*, 2008 NYSCJC Annual Report 209 (delays in scheduling a hearing and issuing decisions in six small claims actions); *Matter of Baldwin*, 2009 NYSCJC Annual Report 74 (significant delays in three small claims matters); *Matter of Trickler*, 2016 NYSCJC Annual Report 222 (ten-month delay in scheduling a trial in a case involving alleged violations of the Environmental Conservation Law).

The ethical standards require every judge to dispose of court matters “promptly, efficiently and fairly” (Rules, §100.3[B][7]). The “informal and simplified” procedures for small claims are intended to provide litigants with an efficient and just resolution to their legal disputes (Uniform Justice Court Act [“UCJA”] §1804). This goal is thwarted when a simple matter that could have been resolved expeditiously is delayed for over a year through no fault of the parties. *See Matter of Gilpatric*, 2011 NYSCJC Annual Report 97. A small claim is not insignificant to the parties involved, and for litigants whose cases may represent their only personal involvement with the courts, an unduly delayed resolution of their dispute would likely convey the impression that the judicial system is inefficient and insensitive to their concerns.

Here, respondent’s apparent uncertainty about how to process the defendant’s demand for a jury trial obviously does not excuse the excessive delay. While

respondent, who had never previously handled a small claims jury trial request, appears to have recognized that the defendant's unsworn submission did not meet the statutory requisite (*see* UJCA §1806; *Village of Castleton on the Hudson v Pillsworth*, 184 Misc2d 284, 285 [Sand Lake Justice Ct Rensselaer Co 2000]) and asked her to submit a notarized filing, it is unclear why he then inexplicably delayed and repeatedly adjourned the matter for over a year, instead of seeking guidance from the City, Town and Village Courts Resource Center.

After the defendant filed a notice of appeal in the matter, respondent further neglected his judicial responsibilities by failing to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court. Respondent's claim that he was awaiting the results of the Commission's investigation before acting on the appeal is patently unacceptable since he was required to comply with the statutory directives, and his unfamiliarity with appeal procedures does not excuse his failure to seek appropriate guidance. *See Matter of Ayres*, 30 NY3d 59 (2017) (judge failed to file the court's return in a timely manner despite multiple directives to do so from County Court). Respondent's failure to diligently discharge his judicial duties in the matter was contrary to ethical standards and statutory mandates, with adverse consequences not only to the litigants, but to public confidence in the administration of justice as a whole.

In accepting the jointly recommended sanction of censure, we note that respondent has acknowledged his misconduct and has assured the Commission that he will seek guidance from the Resource Center when needed, and we trust that he will diligently discharge his judicial duties in the future. We also take this opportunity to

remind all judges of the numerous resources provided by the court system that are available to them, including the Resource Center and the Advisory Committee on Judicial Ethics, when questions about procedures or their judicial responsibilities arise.


By reason of the foregoing, the Commission determines that the appropriate disposition is censure.

STATEMENT OF FACTS**

A Justice of the Columbia Town Court,

Subject to the approval of the Commission on Judicial Conduct

(“Commission”):

IT IS HEREBY STIPULATED AND AGREED by and between Robert H. Tembeckjian, Administrator and Counsel to the Commission, and Honorable John M. Skinner (“Respondent”), who is representing himself in this matter, that further proceedings are waived and that the Commission shall make its determination upon the following facts, which shall constitute the entire record in lieu of a hearing.

1. Respondent has been a Justice of the Columbia Town Court, Herkimer County, since 2009. His current term expires on December 31, 2020. Respondent is not an attorney.
2. Respondent was served with a Formal Written Complaint dated February 14, 2018. He filed an Answer dated April 10, 2018.

As to Charge I

3. From May 2015 to November 2016, while presiding over *Erek Treen-Goff v Heidi Schimmelpfennig*, a small claims proceeding, Respondent failed to be

faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it, and failed to dispose of the matter promptly, efficiently and fairly, in that:

- A. Respondent unduly delayed holding a hearing and failed to decide the defendant's request for a jury trial until after he rendered judgment;
- B. Respondent failed to direct his court clerk to prepare minutes of the proceeding and to file a return with the County Court pursuant to Section 1704 of the Uniform Justice Court Act; and
- C. Respondent failed to mechanically record any appearances in the matter, in violation of Section 30.1 of the Rules of the Chief Judge (22 NYCRR §30.1) and Administrative Order 245/08.

As to the Specifications to Charge I

4. On April 14, 2015, Erek Treen-Goff filed a notice of small claim in the Columbia Town Court against Heidi Schimmelfennig. 

IT IS FURTHER STIPULATED AND AGREED that if the Commission accepts this Agreed Statement of Facts, the parties waive oral argument and waive further submissions to the Commission as to the issues of misconduct and sanction, and that the Commission shall thereupon impose a public Censure without further submission of the parties, based solely upon this Agreed Statement. If the Commission rejects this Agreed Statement of Facts, the matter shall proceed to a hearing and the statements made herein shall not be used by the Commission, the Respondent or the Administrator and Counsel to the Commission.
